• 2017 11U Chair Report

With the implementation of the new AA rule in 11U giving more opportunity for Associations to field AA t eams we saw an immediate increase in AA teams, 6 more than last year, making the AA tournament considerably more competitive.

Adding to this was the Comox team, which was granted approval to move down from T2 to AA after being evaluated by myself. This was not an easy decision as the 11U division has not allowed Any movement down in recent years and after seeing and hearing much about the Comox teams results during summer league play and during the provincial tournament I doubt if I would allow this again. Without a different method of placing teams in appropriate 11U levels I'm not sure what could be done, but what I am sure of is that this move down created way too much attention and distraction to be worth all the time and stress.

I also found that through out what I will call "the question and answer period" (some of June and all of July) leading up to the provincial tournaments to be increasingly aggravating, mot only due to the number of questions being asked about our rules for summer ball, but the seemingly total lack of interest in learning the rules.

I hope its not just me, but this I found that a portion of the coaches at this age group lack baseball integrity and at

times tend to worry and/or throw doubt into every situation to better their selfishly perceived position instead of just looking after their own team. The solution to this I believe is that more presidents need to focus

their efforts at this level to better the group, better the play and keep these players playing instead of worrying.

My favorite memories of this year's summer 11U tournaments:

being asked by a team manager (The head coach) what a rule was so he wouldn't have to waste his own time reading the rules. I did tell him the rule, with a big smile and added that the rule book would be upheld if I didn't get it right.

- having to suspend a coach due to allowing a travesty of the game to take place.
 - having to ensure a coach that the baseballs BCBA were supplying were appropriate at this age group, his

concern was the harder core.... Ie: too many home runs is what he was implying, he may be right, the bats or weapons of choice may be over the top for this age group.

- having to invite the UIC on to the field to help the umpires uphold their original call which a coach had convinced them to change.
- having to take parents outrage for the travesty and numerous other issues, they have no boundaries anymore.
- having to support the other 3 11U provincial BCBA directors dealing with drinking, drugs and police issues.
- Besides reliving the exciting life and times of the BCBA directors (and the BCBA Discipline Committee)
 I'd like to congratulate all the teams who participated in the zones to make the provincial tournaments, a nd to those who didn't make it, good luck with your programming, we look forward to seeing you next year.

BC Baseball 13U Peewee 2017 Year in Review and Recommended Rule Changes

• 2017 Spring 13U:

13UA – no particular issues

13UAA- GVBA and remainder of Van Island tiered for the first time with by far mostly favourable Reviews. For 2017 GVBA needs to field minimum 5 13U AA teams if overall 13U registration numbers stay comparable.

-lower mainland-interlock split. One of the interlock groups scheduled 28 league games, far too many to allow for practice and development. In my opinion, the attempt by one interlock group to get all the "better "players and teams in one group didn't work out. There is no way to know from year to year who will have the best players and teams. In fact in spring 2017 the "not as good" group worked out to have as many or more strong or stronger teams than the other group. Splitting geographically to allow easier travel and scheduling would make sense.

Overall: Confrontational interactions with umpires has increased.

Pace of play has become dreadfully slow.

2017 Summer 13U:

The number of teams in AAA increased significantly. In looking at the province as a whole, the 13UAAA summer schedule was divided into pools and berths provided to zones to allow teams outside the lower mainland whose numbers warrant playing 13UAAA a realistic opportunity to play in a Provincial Tournament.

A time limit of 1 min 30 sec was used at 13UAAA and AA Provincial Tournaments to speed up the pace of the games.

Procedures and fees for Provincial Championship winners that travel (AA and AAA)should be discussed at the summer ball meetings in June.

• 2017 13U Overall:

Overall I would say the 13U Division is very strong but player development, which happens more in practice than games, must continue to be a priority.

Non-confrontation rule regarding umpires must be reinstated in its entirety for 13U and younger divisions.

Recommended Rule Changes:

- 1. Associations must be required to submit a "team contact person" and their contact information, for each summer team at the time of declaration and on the same form.
- 2. Change declaration date for 13U AA and A summer teams changed to June 10 or earlier.
- 3. Change roster and summer payment for all submission date for 13UAAA, AA and A changed to June 20.
- 4. Non-confrontation of umpire rule must be reinstated in its entirety at 13U and younger age levels.
- 5. Player's granted a permanent move up not be eligible to pitch in the league they move up to until the following year when they would be at the proper age for the division. The reason is that pitch counts by division are based on physical maturity, not skill, so players would need to be subject to lower division pitch counts which would be virtually impossible to track.

Recommended website change:

Summer team declarations, including a contact name and contact info for each team being declared, should be done directly onto the BC Baseball website, with Directors having access. Far too much time is spent trying to chase down who to send info to regarding summer teams.

• AA – Trevor McGuire

• The single season concluded with a scramble for provincial berths and Wild Card berths. All teams were very strong this year with player development happening for pitching and all field positions. Great baseball was witnessed over the 4 day tournament, with several games being very top notch baseball.
