thank all of you for joining us in supporting and cheering on the Huskies in the 2018 season. Without the continued support of the directors, coaches, support staff, alumni, sponsors, volunteers, and our fans, we could not continue to provide the local community with the high level of entertainment that we see from the Edmonton Huskies each week. Special thanks to the Edmonton Eskimos for their generous support through the 50/50 at Eskimo's home games.

The success of the Huskies' program is exemplified by the vast achievements of our alumni. While some enjoyed the privilege of playing in the CFL, many have become leaders in the community. The alumni are the backbone of the Huskies' organization; some have returned as directors or coaches, others loyal supporters, but all have ensured the continued success of the program. The culture of our team is one of family, respect, and commitment. These are not just strong values to follow on a football field, but values these young men will use as they grow and become active members of our society. The discipline of training, learning teamwork, following the leadership of coaches and captains, and learning to lose, provide invaluable lifelong skills for athletes. As the legendary John Wooden stated, "Sports do not build character, they reveal it."

The 2017 season brought us success both on and off the field. This past September, the inaugural Huskies' Hall of Fame (HOF) class was announced at the 2017 Gala Dinner. The Dinner celebrated the accomplishments of our first coach, Dr. Murray Smith, who sadly passed away earlier this year, together with the Huskies' first President, Charles "Chuck" Henderson, Vic Chmelyk (player 1958-1960 and coach 1968-1976), Ron Forwick (player 1962-1964), John Pyra (player 1966-1969 and builder 1986-2004), Tim Prinsen (player 1989-1992), J.R. Larose (player 2002-2005), and the 1962 National Championship Team. The Dinner was very successful, with the ticket proceeds funding scholarship opportunities for Huskies'

players and a portion of the proceeds being directed to the Gender Based Violence Prevention Program (GBVPP). GBVPP is dedicated to creating a culture of impact and change within our community while fostering and inspiring leadership in young men.

On September 15th, 2018, the 2018 Gala Dinner will celebrate the next HOF class, with the proceeds again funding scholarship opportunities for Huskies' players and support of the GBVPP. The Huskies have been proud partners of GBVPP for the past three seasons and we have seen greater awareness and involvement in the community by our players. Information regarding the 2018 Gala Dinner may be found on the Huskies' website. We hope our alumni, sponsors and fans will continue to support this event.

On the field, the Huskies have become stronger and stronger over the past few years and 2017 saw the Huskies rise to the top of the PFC, with a 7-1 record. A heart-breaking three point loss to the Regina Thunder in the PFC semi-final ended our season but the Huskies showed they were among the top teams in the country. For the returning veterans, it only increased their resolve to get better and we have seen that commitment in the off-season workouts. We are pleased that Head Coach Iain MacLean returns with almost all of his coaching staff intact, as their exceptional leadership continues to bring back stability and pride to the football program. Iain and his experienced coaching staff have done a great job recruiting in the off-season and we are certain that this year's team will play a tough, disciplined brand of football. The return of key veterans, coupled with exciting new prospects, will only bode well for an exciting 2018 season. We look forward to settling back in our seats and enjoying a competitive season. Best of luck to the Edmonton Huskies and all other members of the Prairie Football Conference. We look forward to seeing our great alumni at games (and at the September 15th, 2018 Gala Dinner) to cheer on a team that shows lots of promise.


Recipient - Gaetano Minto

BOB LINDBERG – An all-star fullback, it was as President of the club, a position he held





THE GENDER BASED VIOLENCE PREVENTION PROGRAM



CULTIVATING A CULTURE OF IMPACT & CHANGE

IN THEIR THIRD SEASON WITH THE PROGRAM, THE EDMONTON

Huskies organization continues their commitment to providing players a continuous learning environment whereby every individual is provided coaching, to not only elevate their level of skill and play, but also their character and community connections. Sport is a defining part of our culture. Sport gives structure to countless youth and their families, with practices and competitions dictating weekly schedules, and wins and losses providing a moral framework for their development. GBVPP seeks to, and is, enriching the lives and building the character of athletes and coaches, with an effort put forth to have a positive effect on society, as a whole. GBVPP cultivates the character development, leadership skills, and long-term welfare of athletes, coaches and teams.

The Gender Based Violence Prevention Program (GBVPP) is a multi campus and community initiative designed to increase awareness, education, communication, inclusion, and safety. The program is designed to give participants the education, tools, and skills necessary to educate themselves and their peers in gender based violence and bystander intervention. GBVPP focuses specifically on engaging young men in violence prevention work and more specifically, utilizes the medium of athletics. Athletics provides a public spotlight and powerful opportunity for athletes (and teams) to play a leadership role in addressing gendered violence on campuses, in the community, and also in their role as community partners.

Football is one of the premier lenses through which we define masculinity in our culture and the sports world is not a hermetically sealed arena, cut off from the real world. It is here, in this sports arena, where we can begin to see that sport is a microcosm to our larger society and societal issues.

GBVPP training engages participants in skill building and analysis, focusing on fostering authentic relationships, personal connection, and the mastery of skills and knowledge necessary for effective communication. The program focuses on real-life scenarios that help young adults to recognize abusive behaviour. The program develops the confidence and skills to interrupt those negative behaviours that perpetuate a culture of violence within the community. GBVPP, combined with athletics, offers a positive leadership-focused approach that emphasizes the role everyone on a team or program can play in creating a respectful atmosphere. Working with sport gives us powerful entry points for prevention strategies, with the athletes taking a key lead role to influence change amongst their peer culture. The leadership and bystander focus allows issues of gender violence prevention to be framed within the context of inclusion and responsibility, for everyone.

baseball player who began playing in Alberta's senior leagues at the tender age of fifteen. He was much in demand over the years and ended his playing days here in Edmonton, with the Blue Willow Angels.

A University of Alberta grad, Arnie began his teaching career in Red Deer, before moving to Jasper Place High School, a school which in those days was a designated Huskies school. The Rebels had a great run of success under Arnie's guidance, winning two City Championships and reaching the final in a third. J.P. also produced several Huskies players that carried that success forward with them into the junior ranks, including Bill Stevenson, Terry Cairns, Bill Evans, Larry Tibble, Bruce Grant, Jim Lazaruk, Jack Fenton, Rod Buga, Ed Brown, Gary Heiberg and others.

The phrase, "Once a Huskie always a Huskie," definitely applies to Arnie Enger and dates back to the days of Murray Smith and Norm Kimball, as these men conducted clinics for beginning coaches

in Central Alberta, in the early 1960's. In 1966, Arnie was invited to join the Huskies coaching staff as an Assistant under Head Coach Paul Brady, with Warren Hansen and Denny O'Donnel completing the staff. In 1967, he coached with the Canadian Champion Golden Bears before returning to the Rebels and winning the City Championship in 1968.

Arnie then returned to the Huskies in the late 1980's, as the crew coordinator for game day timing, statistics and, of course, as the dulcet-toned public address announcer. He also coordinated, at the request of EFOA, the yardsticks and ball boys from the late 1990's to the early 2000's, eventually ending his football activities after the 2016 season.

These days Arnie is back and forth between his cabin at Sylvan Lake and his home here, in Edmonton. He is still an active supporter of the Huskies through events such as the upcoming Gala/Hall of Fame event and Arnie admits that, as an unbiased announcer, he continues to have a soft spot for the Huskies and he follows their progress closely.

AN INTERVIEW WITH J.R. LAROSE



A DIAMOND IN THE ROUGH

WHEN TALKING WITH ALUMNI ABOUT WHICH OF THE GREAT

Huskies teams was better, or who was the most significant player to wear the black and gold jersey, one thing is for certain... J.R. LaRose is considered to be among the all-time best. By any standards, it would be difficult to try and match J.R.'s accomplishments and recognition as a football player. And that is the rough part of this man. Because, when you take into consideration the impact he has made, away from the gridiron, we all are proud of the diamond standard he's set.

J.R.'s beginnings in football are about as 'Edmonton' as one could get. A visit to his elementary school from Henry 'Gizmo' Williams inspired him to give football a try. J.R. started playing with the Edmonton Chargers (Susan Morgan's team) and moved up to the Strathcona Lords for his high school years. In his senior year, numerous teams sought after J.R. It wasn't so much the promises and perks that caught J.R.'s interest during this period. Rather, it was an Edmonton Huskies assistant coach that offered what J.R. knew he was looking for.

Samanji Akili had played for three years in the NFL as a defensive back with San Diego and Houston. I wanted to play at the best level of football I could, so I figured, why not learn from the best? And, that's exactly what happened. I have never met a coach who was as technical as Samanji. A great recruiting story is that, while all the other recruiters took me out for a great dinner, Samanji took me to the local McDonald's. It was then that I knew he was real. He was the only person recruiting me that told me I would have to earn a spot on the roster, if I were to play for the Huskies.

In J.R.'s third year with the Huskies, Kavis Reed, the Defensive Coordinator for the Hamilton Tiger Cats called J.R. up and invited him to come east for a try-out at a free agency camp. In order to do so, the Eskimos would have to release J.R.'s rights, as he was still an area-protected junior. At the time, J.R. wasn't even on the Esks' radar, But, once the Eskimos realized that they might have a quality player right under their noses, they didn't take any chances and brought him out to their own training camp. J.R. immediately earned a spot on the Esks' practice roster. Once the NFL cuts made their way north, that season, J.R. was sent back down to the Huskies for the remainder of that year. J.R. went on to win his second of two Canadian Championships (2004-2005) with the Huskies. When the Eskimos invited J.R. back after his graduating year, he didn't waste any time making himself known in the CFL as he moved right into a starting role with the club. 2008 was J.R.'s last year with the Eskimos, as he sustained what could have been a career-ending injury, by snapping his leg in half (a shattered tibia).

In 2010, J.R. was invited by Wally Buono to try out for the B.C. Lions. J.R. was offered a contract with the team, almost immediately. Hands down, Wally Buono is the best coach for whom he played. J.R. was with the club for 5 years, retiring prior to the 2015 season. Going into free agency that season, J.R. knew that he just didn't have the love for the game anymore.

Being the aggressive style of player that I was, you have to have the right mind set to continue to play at such a competitive level. I just didn't have it anymore, after so many years.



A large part of J.R.'s decision to retire when he did is that his priorities had shifted to his family. In addition, some off-field opportunities were taking up more of his time and interest, so J.R. had to consider how to best meet those needs. As a professional football player, J.R. was able to begin to sew some seeds in the area of motivational speaking. J.R. had earned a ton of respect from teammates and his opponents through the way he conducted himself. J.R. was able to transfer that type of leadership, along with the skills set he'd developed, into a speaking career, that guickly flourished. As a Huskie, coach Samanji Akili always said to J.R. that, when a person has the ability and an opportunity to make an impact, they should make the most of it. This philosophy really resonated with J.R.

Having had the opportunity to go pro has provided me with a platform to reach out to others. By sharing my personal story and experiences with others, I am impacting the lives of others and I am making the most of it. I am not a person who has come from privilege. I've had to work for everything I have. Knowing that there are so many young people out there that come from the same roots as me, and being totally aware of all the challenges they are faced with, I have a unique opportunity of spreading the message of 'Hope'.

J.R. continues to be passionate about his opportunities to share his life story with people across Canada and the United States, through

his motivational speaking engagements.

J.R. believes that each of us can either choose to take on a victim mentality, or we can accept the fact that we all have greatness within us. J.R. has had the pleasure of working directly with many groups; high schools, universities, government, corporate offices, and unions/trade unions. He has directed a lot of his resources into addressing the cultural issue of violence against women. He is a spokesperson for the Ending Violence Association of B.C. [EVA BC - http://endingviolence.org/] In addition, J.R. has worked with all the CFL teams (players and staff) in this area. J.R. feels extremely blessed and fortunate to be able to do this type of work. Recently, J.R. has started to delve into the field of providing individuals with supplemental insurance. He is currently working with both pro and amateur athletes.

The experience of being a Huskie was the foundation for building the framework from which J.R. has been able to do and accomplish so many things in his life. Specifically, it was his Huskies' coach, Samanji Akili, who showed him, not only how to be a man, but also the technical aspects of what is takes to be successful as a professional football player (a defensive back). Samanji also nurtured attitude, specifically, 'Don't slack off.'



I am a Huskie for life. Many individuals such as Bob Bula and Mike Assaly were a constant source of support. Where obstacles were in the way, these men were there to help me find a way past them. So many people have believed in me. I want to be a person, who believes in others. I want to let them know that they are not alone. This is a lesson that I learned as a Huskie.

J.R. and his wife, Caryn, continue to maintain solid roots in Edmonton. They often return to our fair city to spend time with family and friends. Caryn and J.R. are the proud parents of two young men, Katrell (15) and Alozie (12). Both boys are active in football and other sports. The LaRose home is a very competitive place at this stage of their lives with, perhaps a couple more diamonds in the making?

GUNNAR THURROTT

LEADING IN OUR COMMUNITY

GUNNAR THURROTT WAS AN IMPACTFUL TEAM LEADER AS A

player with last season's outstanding Huskies squad. To assume that this 2017 Huskie Graduate's days as a trail blazer ended with a successful football career would be a mistake. In fact, it would seem that Gunnar's sphere of influence is only just beginning.

Gunnar is the type of individual who 'breaks the mould' when it comes to first impressions. Few, if any, of his defensive opponents have lined up across the line of scrimmage and finished their day feeling that they weren't challenged and pushed to their physical, cognitive, or emotional limits. Each of Gunnar's opponents fully learned the lesson that, it's not the size of the man that counts, if you've ever had Gunnar in your face for an entire game.

If there is a person who commands respect through his actions, it's Gunnar. And that is exactly what the Canadian Junior Football League confirmed when Gunnar Thurrott received the C.J.F.L.'s highest honour, in his senior year, in recognition of the exemplary work for which he has committed himself to pursuing in conjunction with Colleen Pirie and the Gender Based Violence Prevention Program [GBVPP – Pg. 16]. Of the many fine men that were nominated across Canada in 2017, it was Gunnar who received the Past Commissioners Community Service Award from the league.

Gunnar is a pretty humble man, if you ask him about his many accomplishments and successes. As great offensive linemen tend to do, he'll deflect or give the credit to those around him. But, if you ask him about his thoughts and opinions on social change, his passion and sincerity immediately begins to show. Gunnar vividly recalls the day when Colleen Pirie addressed the Huskies' players about GBVPP, for the first time. He wasn't completely enamoured with the presentation and didn't pull any punches on the evaluation form when asked to provide 'honest' feedback. Gunnar does not shy away from serious challenges, so when Colleen reached out to Gunnar, he did what most leaders do when given the opportunity to make an impact... He stepped up to the plate and took the lead in working with Colleen, the players, and the Huskies organization in what has turned out to be a highly rewarding implementation of the GBVPP. As a young man who has a notable profile in a violent sport, Gunnar is in the unique position of being able to make a close connection with his audiences. He builds an environment of trust



Teenagers get a really bad rap in today's world. I don't think we give them enough credit about how hard it is to be fifteen years old. The demands and pressures that kids live with can be extreme. Adults don't talk to kids as much as they should and adults certainly don't listen to kids, if they do. There is often a generational disconnection. When it comes to delivering an education program, with respect to influencing attitudes around gender roles, sexual behaviour, drinking and drugs, sometimes the messenger can be as important as the message they deliver. We need to be able to talk to kids, while remembering that they are people, too.



Gunnar is in his fourth year of being active with the Gender Based Violence Prevention Program. It's a not-for-profit organization and he has graduated from volunteering, to making presentations on behalf of the GBVPP for a small stipend. His work with the program has set Gunnar along a path of, "helping young adolescents to negotiate their way through the struggles that many of them face in today's society".

Gunnar was born into the generation that has been labelled as the group that is expected to fix all of the things that are wrong with the world. He is 'one of them' and, that is why he has had so much success in reaching out to his peers. Within this new generation, there is such a high expectation for each person to make a difference. The pressure is huge. Through his presentations, Gunnar wants his peer group to know that it is OK not to be good at everything. As soon as you believe that you have to care about everything, that's when you can't do anything. Gunnar shares his message that helping others shouldn't be a competition, nor is there a hierarchy. Dedicating yourself to reducing world pollution is just as honourable as making sure that a homeless person has some food in their belly, today. In fact, solely dedicating yourself to being the best person you can, should be a perfectly acceptable societal expectation.

The focus of my presentations is around the understanding of what 'consent' means. **Decisions made by anyone can** be hard enough at the best of times. It can be very confusing when each of us don't have a clear understanding of what is acceptable. My audiences are very comfortable with me as a presenter. They come with a lot of important questions and I am able to create a safe environment, in which they are willing to pretty much ask anything.

Whether you wore the black and gold Huskies jersey in the 1950's, or more recently, one thing is for sure, Huskies alumni are rooting for Gunnar as he pursues one of his passions. The Huskies family fully supports his efforts in pushing for significant cultural shifts that might lead to a kinder and gentler society.
