

2016 Berks County Chapter of the PA Hall of Fame Inductees



Kermit Cintron

The two-time world boxing champion, who resides in Berks County, wrestled in high school before taking up boxing at the age of 19.

He compiled a 24-5 amateur record, then turned pro in 2000.

He won his first 24 fights and claimed the WBO welterweight title in 2004 and the IBF welterweight crown in 2006.

He retired in 2014 with a 35-5-2 record, including 28 knockouts.



Linda Davis

Davis coached field hockey at Wilson for 28 years, winning 235 games, a county title and six division titles.

She coach-ed 12 Division I scholarship players, including Olympian Katie Kauffman and Kim Schroll, the current Wilson coach who played on an NCAA champion at North Carolina.

Davis also coached basketball at Wilson, winning a county title.

She is a member of the Wilson and Berks field hockey halls of fame.



Brent Fenstermacher

Fenstermacher was a two-sport standout at Kutztown High in the 1980s, scoring a school-record 94 goals as an All-State soccer player and helping the basketball team finish 27-3 and reach the state quarterfinals.

He was a four-time All-PSAC and two-time All-American selection in soccer at East Stroudsburg, where he set school records for goals and assists.

He played pro soccer for the Philadelphia Freedom and Reading Rage.

He has coached scholastic soccer at Kutztown, Gov. Mifflin and, currently, Berks Catholic.



Mike Gyomber

Entering this season, Gyomber has compiled a 432-53 record and won 16 Berks, 12 District 3 and five PIAA team titles as the boys tennis coach at Wyomissing.

He also coached the Wyomissing girls team for eight seasons, compiling a 143-9 record and winning three Berks, three District 3 and two PIAA titles.

His teams have produced two PIAA singles champions and three PIAA doubles champions.

Gyomber was an outstanding lineman for Wilson football in the 1970s.



Dave Pacella

Pacella was a three-sport standout at Reading High in the 1970s.

He was an All-State and Big 33 selection as a lineman, finished as high as second in the district and fourth in the state in wrestling and threw the javelin and shot put in track.

He was a four-year offensive lineman at the University of Maryland, earning All-ACC honors and All-American honorable mention.

He went on to play in the USFL with the Washington Federals in 1983 and '84, then briefly with the Philadelphia Eagles and New York Jets.



Chris Riegel

Riegel was an outstanding gymnast who graduated from Holy Name in 1982 and the University of Nebraska in 1986.

He won seven PIAA gold medals.

He was a member of Nebraska's NCAA champions in 1982 and '83 and received 11 All-American honors.

He won two U.S. national titles in vaulting and 17 medals in international competition and was an alternate on the 1984 U.S. Olympic team.



Randy Simcox

Simcox was Wilson's outstanding male athlete as a senior in 1979.

He was a three-time All-Berks selection in football. He earned All-State honors as a senior and made the Big 33 team.

He was also a three-time All-Berks selection in baseball.

He went on to become a four-year starter and team captain in baseball at Penn State.

He is a member of the Wilson High and Berks football halls of fame.




Marty Stallone

Stallone was a fooball, basketball and track standout at Wyomissing from 1979-83.

He was a two-time All-Berks selection at quarterback and set school passing records for attempts, completions and TD passes.

He went on to play quarterback at Cornell, leading the team to an 8-2 record and second place in the Ivy League as a senior in 1986.

Grant Krow



Krow was a basketball and track standout at West Reading High School.

He was a starter on West Reading's 1959 PIAA basketball champions and won district and state titles in the high and long jumps.

He went on to become a five-time MAC champion in the high and long jumps at Albright College, setting school records in high, long and triple jumps and winning the NCAA college division high jump in 1963.

He continued to compete in Masters track events until 1989 and was a longtime chemistry professor at Temple University.

He died in 2015 at the age of 73.
