TODAY'S GAME-

Team USA and Canada meet for a second time this year, a rematch of the opening game for both teams at the 2021 Para Ice Hockey World Championship. Dating back to the 2014 Paralympics, the U.S. is 4-1 in gold-medal games in both Sled Worlds and Paralympics combined. Tonight's game will also be a rematch of the 2019 Sled Worlds, a game in which the U.S. won in overtime, 3-2. The U.S. has not lost multiple games at Sled Worlds dating back to 2009, and hasn't lost back-to-back Sled Worlds games against Canada since 2000.

- TALKING POINTS -

GOLD STREAK

The U.S. is playing in its seventh consecutive Worlds gold-medal game, having won four of six gold-medal games to date. The U.S. and Canada have met four times during this streak, splitting the series 2-2. The teams sit at an even 7-7 in four games played, with two games decided by just one goal.

REMATCH OF GAME 1The U.S. and Canada opened preliminary play against one another, in a closely contested 2-1 game. The U.S. outshot Canada 16-9, but Canada's power play would give them the edge over the U.S. scoring twice on the man advantage. Since then, both teams have won every game, including three consecutive shutouts by the U.S.

SERIES VS. CANADA

Since the 2014-15 season, the two teams have met 29 times, with the U.S. posting a 19-4-1-5 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record. All-time, the teams have met on 102 occasions with Team USA holding a 34-11-8-48-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) record. Combined, the two teams have captured the last seven world championships and last five Paralympic titles.

Two years ago, Team USA and Canada met in the gold-medal game of the 2019 Para Ice Hockey World Championship where **Declan Farmer** (Tampa, Fla.) scored with 3:26 to play in regulation to send the game into overtime. **Brody Roybal** (Northlake, III.) scored the game-winning goal 5:08 into overtime, giving Team USA its fourth gold medal in World Championship history.

AUTOMATIC ON THE DRAW

Three of the top-four tournament leaders in faceoffs play for Team USA. **Declan Farmer** leads all tournament players with a 74.49 win percentage, while **Rico Roman** (67.31) and **Josh** Misiewicz (65.00) rank third and fifth, respectively. Fármer's +48 ranks first in tournament faceoff +/-, and his 73 total wins rank tops by two wins.

POINT STREAKS

Brody Roybal and Josh Pauls are both riding four-game point streaks in 2021 Para Ice Hockey World Championships. Both players are currently on eight-game point streaks at Para Ice Hockey World Championships dating back to 2019 Worlds. Roybal has scored 17 points and 11 goals (11-6--17) in eight games, while Pauls has scored 16 points and four goals (4-12-16) in his eight games.

STAYING DISCIPLINED

The U.S. is ranked second in fewest penalties taken with 18 min, just two minutes shy of fewest penalties among all teams. Canada ranks fourth among all teams with most penalties, with 26 penalty minutes.

TEAM USA IN WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP PLAY

The U.S. has captured four gold medals in the events' 10-year history and enters the 2021 event seeking a seventh-straight berth to the gold-medal game. This is the third time the event will take place in Ostrava, which hosted the 2009 and 2019 world championships, both resulting in gold medals for Team USA.

LEADING TEAM USA -

David Hoff, USA Hockey's Northern Plains District Coach-In-Chief and assistant coach of the gold medal-winning 2018 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team, is in his third season as head coach of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. This is Hoff's fifth season with Team USA after making his debut in the 2016-17 season.

Josh Pauls, who has helped the U.S. capture gold medals in the last three Paralympic Winter Games (2010, 2014, 2018), is serving as captain of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. In addition, two-time Paralympic gold medalists (2014, 2018) Declan Farmer and Rico Roman are serving as alternate captains.

This marks Pauls' 13th season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his fourth as team captain while Farmer is entering his ninth season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his fourth as an alternate captain. A Purple Heart recipient and U.S. Army Veteran, Roman is serving as an alternate capitain for a thirdstraight year as he begins his 10th season with Team USA.

PRIDE TAPE

Captain **Josh Pauls**, alongside several teammates, have taped up their sticks with Pride Tape in celebration of Pride Month. Pauls thought of his home city and wanted to support Pride St. Louis, an organization that has supported the LGBTQ+ community for more than 40 years in St. Louis. To add a competitive twist, he wants his game to do the talking: \$10 per point he scores, \$20 for every USA win and a \$50 donation if the team wins gold. Teammates **Brody Roybal**, **David Eustace** and **Kyle Zych** have also jumped into the tournament with Pride Tape and promised donations.

When asked about his inspiration for the initiative, Pauls had this to say: "We have a lot of guys who want to give back, and are able to give back. We're all going through that learning process as a team and becoming more educated. We're family on this team. You never know when you'll meet a gay teammate and I want to make sure they're welcomed with open arms."

WEDDINGS DELAYED

Josh Pauls and Kevin McKee have both been planning weddings for more than two years, with plans constantly being changed or canceled due to the COVID 19 pandemic. With the team meeting for camp this summer following the tournament, both players have scheduled their big days and are finally full steam ahead.

From there, the team boarded a plane on Sunday, June 13, and traveled overnight to Vienna, Austria, where the U.S. players and staff boarded a bus for a three-hour trip to Ostrava. Since its arrival, Team USA has held four practices at Ostravar Arena ahead of today's tournament-opening game.

USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS

NEW USA HOCKEY PRESIDENT

Mike Trimboli (Massena, N.Y.), who has been involved in grassroots hockey as a player, coach, official and administrator for parts of the last six decades, was elected president of USA Hockey at last week's Board of Directors Meeting as part of the organization's virtual Annual Congress. In addition to his work with USA Hockey, Trimboli, who retired in 2018 from his role in law enforcement with the New York State Police after over 31 years, has also coached public high school hockey for more than 25 seasons over two stints, including from 1990-2005 and from 2009 until today, winning a Division 1 New York State championship in 2014.

DISABLED SECTION LEADERSHIP

USA Hockey, as part of its virtual Congress, elected **Amy LaPoe** (Hamilton, Tex.) as chair of the disabled section, replacing **J.J. O'Connor** (Mt. Prospect, Ill.) who served in the capacity for 20 years. O'Connor' was elected as a director emeritus as well in the Congress session. LaPoe previously served as a Special Hockey Representative for the Disabled Hockey Section, working with special hockey programs around the country to help them grow and develop in order to allow more individuals with special needs to have the opportunity to play hockey. On a national level she developed new tools and resources and represent special hockey within the Disabled Hockey Section.

LaPoe was originally introduced to hockey over 20 years ago when her son, Spencer, wanted to play. Spencer, who has Down syndrome, originally started playing hockey with the Gateway Locomotives in St. Louis, but when the family relocated to the Chicago area in 2000, LaPoe discovered the need for a special hockey team in the area. With the help of the NHL's Chicago Blackhawks, LaPoe founded what is today recognized as the Chicago Blackhawks Special Hockey Team. Since its creation 16 years ago when it was called Tomahawks Special Needs Hockey, the program has grown and now has over 100 members across three locations in the Chicago area. For her contributions to hockey, LaPoe was inducted into the Illinois Hockey Hall of Fame in 2012 and in 2014 the Dick Butkus Foundation named her a Youth Sports Most Valuable Player at the Chicago Sports Legacy Event.

GROWING THE GAME

USA Hockey announced last week two new volunteer positions to its coaching and officiating education structure, including a coach-in-chief for female development and a referee-in-chief for female development. The two new volunteer positions will be filled through the coaching education and officiating education sections of USA Hockey and will serve in a lead role in developing and implementing strategies to advance efforts related to recruitment, retention and overall support of females currently involved or interested in becoming involved in coaching and officiating.
