# Q/A for Vaccinated Individuals

# What is fully vaccinated?

≥2 weeks after they have received the second dose in a 2-dose series (Pfizer or Moderna), ≥2 weeks after they have received a single-dose vaccine (Johnson and Johnson (J&J)/Janssen)

## Fully vaccinated people can:

- Visit with other fully vaccinated people indoors without wearing masks or physical distancing
- Visit with unvaccinated people from a single household who are at low risk for severe COVID-19 disease indoors without wearing masks or physical distancing
- Refrain from quarantine and testing following a known exposure if asymptomatic

## **Fully vaccinated people should continue to:**

- Wear a well-fitted mask and physical distancing when in public and visiting/living with an unvaccinated persons
  who has an increased risk for severe COVID 19 disease.
- Wear masks, maintain physical distance, with unvaccinated people from multiple households
- Avoid medium and large sized in-person gatherings
- Get tested if experiencing COVID-19 symptoms

#### **Full vaccinated travel guidance:**

The travel guidance to quarantine for 10 days does not apply to those fully vaccinated.

# Fully vaccinated people with COVID-19 symptoms:

- Risk is low that fully vaccinated people could get COVID-19
- If experiencing symptoms isolate and get evaluated for COVID-19, and tested for SARS-CoV-2 if indicated.
- If you test positive for COVID-19 you need to isolate. The COVID-19 vaccines will not make you test positive
  on viral tests.

#### Fully vaccinated people with no COVID-19 like symptoms following an exposure:

- Fully vaccinated people with no COVID-19 like symptoms do not need to quarantine or be tested following an exposure to someone with suspected or confirmed COVID-19, as their risk of infection is low
- Fully vaccinated people who do not quarantine should still monitor for symptoms of COVID-19 for 14 days following an exposure.
