Another successful Hall of Fame event

Six new members inducted at banquet

Another record crowd gathered at the Gladstone Inn in Jamestown the evening of Saturday, April 7 for the annual Hall of Fame banquet which this year welcomed six new members to the Shrine bringing the total to 277. Approximately 130 persons attended including this yeargs inductees and 31 current Hall of Fame members who were individually introduced prior to the banquet. This year inductees include; Dennis Bense, Curt Krahler, Tom Harty, Greg Kaeding and Chuck and Marge Oberg who were inducted posthumously.

The North Dakota Softball Hall of Fame was among the Erst in the United States to recognize and honor those players, coaches, managerø, sponsors and umpires who had been recognized for their contributions to the sport of softball in North Dakota. It was also the Erst in the nation to establish a special building to house the memorabilia from its members. The location has been moved to the Jamestown Civic Center where it shares space with other athletic Halls of Fame. This year marked the 61st anniversary of

McQuade Softball Tournament this weekend. It is the largest charity Softball Tournament in the World. I have been told there are over 450 teams signed up to play. If you have never played in or umpired in this huge event I would highly recommend you give it a try. It is quiet an event. We will be hosting 2 National Tournaments this year. Mandan will be the home of the Menøs Masters 35,45and the Women@s Masters 35 on Aug 24-26th. Fargo will host the Northern D on Aug. 31- Sept 2nd. The Menøs E/Rec Northern National will be held in Liberty, MO. this year on Aug. 24-26. The Menøs C National will be in Prairie Island, MN. Aug. 31-Sept. 3rd. The Masters rosters must be submitted by July 1st. This is very important this year since the Nationals Masters tourney is again in North Dakota. A make-up roster is allowed for both the State and National tournament but we must have them in hand by July 1.

We will be adding 2 new State tournaments this year in North Dakota. Both will be one day events. First will be the Fall State on Saturday Oct. 6th. And the new 5 on 5 on 5 State the following day Oct 7th. Both events will be

held in Fargo. For more info on both events please to to the State Website.

From the Sidelines

This is written the day after the 43rd annual Sam McQuade Charity softball tournament concluded its three day run in Bismarck and Mandan. There were over 700 games played in the three day event and only four of them got rained out on Sunday before a championship game could be played. Two on the Menox Divisions and two in the Women& Divisions. The weather was chancy all weekend but didnøt a ect play until the Łnal day. Huge crowds as usual, special events including the Wounded Warriors for the Lfth year in a row. These amputees are really remarkable and are an inspiration to everyone who sees what they can do despite their handicaps. Also, there was an exhibition game between North Dakota Military All Stars and North Dakota First Responders which drew many spectators. Another feature was the Connie Wolf Cancer Awareness Exhibition Game which raised money for cancer treatments and assistance to care givers. It is named after the late wife of state Umpire in Chief and Co-Director of the McQuade Tournament, Mike Wolf.

It was another exciting three days and I saw many players and umpires I knew. Steve Riswold, the Regional Umpire in Chief from Sioux Falls came up as he has for nine years now. Also, former Region Umpire in Chief from Region 12, Dave Epperson from Topeka, Kansas drove up and enjoyed the tournament. Those two and I spent part of Saturday touring the softball complexes in Bismarck, talking with players and watching umpires working tournament games. We picked a good day to observe umpires since they were wearing lime green shirts and caps with special McQuade logos on them. Pretty easy to spot and nowhere to hide if you blow a call.

Speaking of umpires, I need to say several kind words about one of my favorite umpires, Naomi Erdahl who became the Łrst North Dakota umpire to work the College Womenøs World Series in Oklahoma City this year. She has worked her way up by working major college women softball for


several years and getting certiled as an international qualiked umpire. She had worked Regional and even Super Regional before but this year she worked Regional, Super Regional and Łnally, the College World Series. Not only that but she was one of the umpires who worked what turned out to be the National Championship game. The format pits the Łnal two teams left in the tournament against each other in a three game series. It turned out that Florida State won the Lrst game and followed up with a win in game two which meant they were the National Champions. Naomi was one of the three umpires selected to work the second game. I am so proud of her. she worked hard, traveled many miles to work in this environment and has earned every accolade she gets. She is a remarkable woman and a terriŁc umpire. I know great things are still in her future.

North Dakota will host a couple of National Tournaments this year with Mandan playing host to the Menøs Masters 35 and over plus the Menøs Masters 40 and Over August 24 through 26. Masters 35 will feature 3 Divisions of play depending on classiŁcation with a 3 game guarantee. The Masters 45 will feature an open division with a 3 game guarantee. At the same time and place the Women

Masters 35 will take place with one open division and a 3 game guarantee.

Also on the calendar is the Menøs Northern Class D tournament in Fargo August 31 through September 2. Which I think will be held at the new Fargo Northern complex. If you havengt seen that complex yet, you will be impressed.

A couple of other thoughts. I was honored at the Hall of Fame banquet when the Umpire award of Excellence was named after me and presented to Joe Vuolo of Bismarck whom I have known and admired since he came to town in the 1970 s. From now on that award will be the Walt Stack Umpire Award of Excellence. Makes me feel good. The banquet also featured some umpires who earned Elite status. They were Ben Birkemeyer of Bismarck, Wade Blumhagen also of Bismarck



and Chris Coleman of Hillsboro. Tom Hamkens was also presented the USA Softball National Indicator Fraternity award.

Long time fast pitch Commissioner Jim õRipö Collins of Minot and Gary Tharaldson of Fargo were the recipients of USA Softball of North Dakota Distinguished Service Awards.

Enjoy the rest of the Summer and I hope to see some of you around the diamonds.

J.O. Fastpitch Update

I wanted to review this past High School Softball Season in North Dakota. As you may know, it was a cold Spring and most teams have a 30 ó 36 game season scheduled. Most teams played about 15- 20 games. Playing in doors, turf Łelds, and 6 to 8 games a week were normal this year.

The first 4 weeks were spent mostly indoors for practice, with coaches coming up with a number of di erent ways to practice. That included bowling, playing tag football, watching You Tubes, and playing broom ball. Once the season got started, some teams were playing 4 to 6 games a week. This led to a number of injuries, sore arms, pulled muscles and a line to the trainer s room.

This was the first year, since fastptich softball was sanctioned in 2009, that the West Fargo Packers did not win the Class A title. Congratulation goes out to coach, Gerard Cederstrom and the Minot Magicians, for winning the State Class A championship game. Minot defeated Dickinson Midgets 4 ó 2 in the championship game. Senior pitcher, Marisa Andrysiak pitched all 21 innings in the state tournament to win Minotos Erst ever title.

Minot Łnished the season at 22 ó 8, while Dickinson Łnished 27-3. Minot came in as the 4 seed from the west Defeating Valley City 4 ó 3 in the opening game, and Bismarck Century 8-6 in the semifinals. Century defeated West Fargo High School, in the opening round by a score of 8 ó 4. The tournament was played at Michelson Field in Fargo. Dickinson & Jordan Mcneilly was named Senior Athlete of the year for Class A.

Central Cass, coached by Scott Kost, won its third Class B title (2013 and 2015) defeating the Lakers from Des Lacs-Burlington-Lewis and Clark 11 ó 0, in the Championship game. It was the Squirrels 6th time in 7 years, they had played in the championship game. They Łnished the season with a 21-2 record. The Lakers, coached by Mel Erickson, were the Łrst team from the West to ever play in a championship game. The Squirrels defeated Watford City 13- 3 in the opening round, and Minot Bishop Ryan 10 ó 5 in the semi óŁnals. Minot Ryan took 3rd, Thompson 4th, Kindred-Richland 5th, Northern Cass 6th, Heart River 7th and Watford City 8th. The tournament was played in Jamestown. KindredRichlandøs, Theresa Klinnert was named the Senior Athlete of the vear for Class B

USA Softball of North Dakota, assisted with the 2nd annual East/ West, Senior All-star Games that was played June 4th and 5th. The players are all graduating seniors, and are selected by the High School coaches. This yeards teams consisted of 14 girls from the East, and 14 from the west. Class A and B all stars are selected.

The June 4th game was played at Michelson Łeld in Fargo, and resulted in an extra inning game of 11 innings with the East winning 2 -1. Somehow the game was played in an Hour and 45 minutes. Theresa Klinnert from Kindred-Richland, started the game and Łnished the game pitching 8 innings for the win for the East and striking out 8.

The second game was played in Mandan on Tuesday June 5th. The east came from a 5 -0 deLcit to win the game 10 ó 6. This gave the East all-stars a 4 ó 0 record against the West, in the Erst 2 years of the series. Felicty Blair of Bismarck High, hit 2 Homeruns and with 4 RBIø. Allison Martinson, Grafton hit doubles and 2 RBIøs. Kacee White, Valley City, was 3 for 4. Taylor Ellingson, Grand Forks Central, was the winning pitcher.

On Sunday April 29th, 20, 12U girls tried out for the 2nd Annual All American Games, to be held the weekend of June 29th to July 1st. The Tryout was held in Bismarck and attracted girls from Bismarck, Minot, Dickinson, Moorhead, and Hillsboro. Congratulation to Taylor Chrstensen from Glen Ullin, Keeley Jo Schiermeister, Brielle Wrangham, Gabruella Bird, all of Bismarck and Ondrea Betner form Hillsboro. Head coach from North Dakota is Kyle Christiansen.



A new State Tournament Pickup Player policy will be used in 2018 whereby the manager of a team picking up players for State will have the responsibility to be sure the player is in fact eligible to participate from a classiŁcation standpoint with the team. Failure to uphold the state pickup rule properly could result in the suspension of the manager.

We had a great Hall of Fame Awards banquet in Jamestown this past April. My congratulations to the 2018 HOF inductees Dennis Bense, Tom Harty, Greg Kaeding, Curt Krahler and sponsors Chuck and Marge Oberg who were honored posthumously. We have also added recognition of Umpires to the HOF Banquet. USA Softball Elite Umpire Awards were presented to Ben Birkemeyer of Bismarck, Wade Blumhagen of Bismarck and Chris Coleman of Hillsboro. Tom Hamkens was also presented the USA Softball National Indicator Fraternity award. It takes a lot of hard work and dedication to reach these levels of excellence by umpires and my congratulations and thanks to each of you for all you do for our program. This year we renamed our Umpire Award of Excellence to the USA Softball of North Dakota Walt Stack Umpire Award of Excellence. VOLUNTEERS ó We are SO NEEDED and itos SO REWARD-

This Spring, I had the honor of helping out the Shanley High School fast-pitch team. I received a phone call at the end of February asking if I was interested in assistant coaching, but I felt that with my schedule, I could not dedicate the amount of time needed to be an õo cial coachö but I could volunteer what time I could to just help out. ó One of the BEST decisions I have ever made.

I realized some very important things with this, my first highschool coaching experience.

#1í IAMNOTHIGH-SCHOOL COACHING MATERIAL. There is no way I could do it. I have GREAT RESPECT for any high-school coaches out there! They are not in it for the extra paycheck, that for sure. I showed up pretty regularly and sat back and let the coaches

coach. I helped when needed, helped the pitchers, helped some girls with some fundamentals, so the coaches could do the hard work.

#21 HIGH SCHOOL IS VERY DIFFERENT NOW THAN IT WAS WHEN I WAS IN HIGH SCHOOL. I dongt know if it is every school out there, but it seems like these young women were involved in SO MANY more activities than just softball, which is great, but hard to work around all of their other activities. I remember when it was softball seasoní that was ití softball. Maybe a job working on the weekends, but basically school, softball, homework, bed.

We had some special circumstances with the Shanley team, as this was a team of 24 girls ranging in age from 7th grade to seniors. Their experience ranged from never playing before to already being committed to a college team. And they came from essentially 6 di erent schools and 6 di erent school schedules. You see, it is Shanley, Park Christian, Oak Grove ó but they arenøt all in high school. Some are at the middle schools. It was very di cult getting everyone to practice and games while working around 3 prom weekends, 6 choir concerts and competitions, 6 band concerts, junior and senior banquets, junior lock-ins, senior mission trips, musicals, art shows, 8th grade trip to valley fairí I could go on and oní

#31 VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED! You dongt have to have a kid playing, you dongt need a professional coaching background, you dongt even have to be a head coach or assistant coach. Donate what time you have to help teach fundamentals of the sport, because one or two coaches canot do it all.

Volunteering doesnot have to be just for softball ó I know that coaches are hard to Łnd, especially

with the younger kids, in ANY sport. Soccer, Football, T-ball, anything. I recommend volunteering for anything, it will be rewarding no matter the sport or the age.

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Umpires have pre-season meeting

State UIC and Deputies were to meet

State Umpire in Chief Mike Wolf of Bismarck had a Spring meeting set up in Jamestown for all his deputy Umpires in Chief around the state.

Unfortunately, the Spring weather interfered and the meeting was held on a conference call. Items discussed included the Registration fees to be paid by each registered umpire for the 2018 season. Additional items covered insurance, background checks and lists of non-approved bats.

Also on the agenda were state tournament fees to be charged for each State tournament umpire and for scheduling umpires for state tournaments. Another item was the Umpire Uniform requirement due to the change from ASA Softball to USA Softball North Dakota. North Dakota umpires will be allowed to wear ASA gear through 2019. Those umpires working National Tournaments will wear whatever the UIC for each tournament decides.

UIC Wolf also announced that North Dakota has been awarded a National Umpire School to be held in Bismarck in late April or early May in 2019. Further details will be available for the Fall issue of this paper.

Umpires already assigned to National Tournaments for this season are as follows: Tom Hamkens, Bis-

marck Menøs Slow Pitch, Class A. Ben Birkemeyer, Bismarck, Girløs 18U Gold Fast Pitch, Plano, Texas. And Elliott Gerhardt of Bismarck, 16U Gold Fast Pitch, Plano, Texas.

Naomi Erdahl of Bismarck was been assigned to work the Girl

Gold Cup International Tournament in California. She is the only North Dakota umpire certiLed to work international softball after being certiLed by the World Baseball and Softball Confederation. She also just Lnished umpiring the Women

College World Series in Oklahoma, the Lrst time a North Dakota umpire as had that assignment.

National Council to meet in Oklahoma City October 27 - November 2

The 87th annual Council meeting of USA Softball, the governing body of softball will be held in Oklahoma City from October 27 through November 2, 2018.

The USA Softball Council is comprised of about 300 voting members from all aspects of the sport. The National Council which consists of USA Softball Commissioners, Commissioners Emeri-

tus, Executive Director Emeritus, Council Members, Regional player representatives, JO Commissioners, Elite Athletic Representatives, Regional UICos, Allied Members and Past Presidents is responsible for making decisions on Legislative changes, Rule changes and is solely responsible for awarding National Championship tournaments to host cities across the United States.

Fargo/Moorhead Hall of Fame names 2018 recipients

Induction to be Saturday, August 10

The Fargo/Moorhead Hall of Fame committee has named three fast pitch softball notables and one slow pitch player to this year class of honorees. The new inductees are Mike Bullinger of Fargo; Harry Bergman of Argusville; David Holm of Fargo and Sharon Horsager of Fargo. Induction ceremonies will be held Saturday, August 10 at the new Fargo Park Board Northside softball complex. Biographical information was not available at press time but will be published in the Fall edition of this newspaper.

The Fargo/Moorhead Hall of Fame Council is responsible for selecting the prospective inductees and in presenting them during the

induction ceremony. Bismarck announces campaign to add new softball diamonds

Eight new fields to be added at Cottonwood Park

Bismarck Parks and Recreation District in partnership with the Menøs Slow Pitch Softball Association, the Womenøs Slow Pitch Association and the Bismarck Youth Fast Pitch Association has announced a campaign to Łnance the addition of eight new softball Łelds at Cottonwood Park. Four will be dedicated to adult slow pitch softball and four will be committed to Youth fast pitch.

The three softball associations have pledged a total of \$700,000 to this project while the Board Of Park Commissioners has committed the District to the projects infrastructure, the site work, water, electricity, parking lots and restrooms. The goal is to raise \$650,000 so that the project becomes a community

Softball is big in Bismarck with the Menøs Slow Pitch Association boasting 172 teams in 2017 with over 2,400 players. The Womenøs Slow Pitch Association registered 61 teams with over 900 individuals involved in 2017. The Youth Fast Pitch Association has grown rapidly since the sport was introduced in Bismarck and across the state. In 2017, over 200 girls were playing the game in the Capital city. In addition to these recreational leagues, Bismarck also hosts the Worldøs Largest Weekend Charity softball tournament when the Sam McQuade, Senior tournament comes to town the last weekend in June. This year the tournament has registered over 450 teams for the weekend event.

Cottonwood Park is located in

south Bismarck and was Erst developed with a capital campaign in 1990. Through the years, Cottonwood Park has continued to grow to meet the needs of an active community. Today, the complex consists of 200 plus acres with an elaborate trail system, two playgrounds, seven shade structures, three concession(restrooms) tournament facilities, a maintenance building, BMX track, bocce ball Łelds, 12 softball diamonds, numerous soccer Łelds, a small lake with a Łshing pier and a full sized baseball field with a scoreboard, batting cage, pressbox and ticket booth.

Randy Bina, Executive Director of the Parks and Recreation District emphasizes that the improvements being added to Cottonwood Park will impact the entire community with extensions to the existing trail system, shelters and playgrounds for all to use and enjoy.



and going far and I thought it was going over the fence,ö Minot center Łelder Landry Maragos said. She was right, only she jumped


the fence and caught it before it could cut the Minot lead to one. The Magicians got the next two outs to top Century 8-6.

WBSC reveals Tokyo 2020 Olympic Qualifiers for Baseball, Softball

PARIS -- 24 March 2018

Following the World Baseball Softball Confederation (WBSC) Executive Meeting held today at the headquarters of the French National Olympic and Sports Committee, the WBSC revealed the qualitcation system for the six-team baseball and softball events at the Olympic Games Tokyo 2020, as approved by the International Olympic Committee (IOC).

ROAD TO TOKYO 2020 -SOFTBALL

The Lrst opportunity to qualify for the Olympic Softball medal event at Tokyo 2020 will be this August at the WBSC Women's Softball World Championship 2018 in Chiba, Japan. The 1st Place Łnisher in Chibawill be awarded direct entry into Tokyo 2020 without having to pass through Qualikers. (Should Japan win the WBSC World Championship in Chiba, the 2nd Place Łnisher would be granted the Olympic spot.)

Africa/Europe Qualifier

The Africa/Europe qualitacation event will be an eight-team tournament, where the winner will earn a place at Tokyo 2020. Competing in this Qualiker will be top six knishers from the European Softball Championship 2019 and the top two teams from the African Softball Championship 2019.

Americas Qualifier

The Americas Olympic qualiker will be a maximum 16-team tournament, with the winner and the 2nd Place nation advancing to Tokyo 2020. Eligible nations to compete in this Qualiker will be based on the

**Runner on First-cover positioning with ground ball in inŁeld

**Runner on First & Second-positioning with ground ball in inkeld

**Runner on Second that could score-anticipate-if you dongt think there will be a play at the plate, get out into the Łeld

**Bases loaded-anticipate where the play could go-if you dongt think there will be a play at the plate, get out into the Łeld. However, things could change as the play develops

**With a ground ball to inŁeld with bases loaded or a runner at third, (show positioning with ground ball to in Leld)-may feel out of place, but you are in the right position. Once the throw is made to Erst, start moving toward Erst as far as you can-get set and make call. These will usually be close plays if less that one out because the Łelder will try and look back the runner at third and make the throw at the last second. Since these will usually be bang bang plays, be ready to throw a conkdent overhand out or a sell safe with strong voice-you are going to need to sell your call.

**Get good 90 degree angles when making calls on second and third. Getting theser sometimes in a one man system is tough, but do your best to get there. You will have a much better angle for your calls.

**With tag play at the plate, get into holding zone and then follow the play to the plate and get a good 90 degree angle to make your call. Sell that call if close-either overhand out of safe sell.

**With Runners on base-AN-TICPATE-where the throw from

No big women@ wedding rings. Be careful with jewelry and being too lenientif someone gets hurt wearing it, they are going to blame/sue you for not telling them to take it o!

**Eiections-Get Needed Information-Dongt deal with player other than getting their address-Get Managers Signature-If they refuse to give you information or sign the form dongt pursue. Just make sure you get the players jersey #. Call Mike immediately after game if you have an ejection.

Softball umpire reaching the top

When Naomi Erdahl got the call, she was at an airport on a layover.

Such is the life of a Division I umpire.

After learning she was one of eight umpires selected to work the NCAA Division I College Softball World Series in Oklahoma City earlier this month, Erdahl's thoughts quickly turned to those who helped her reach the top of the profession.

"It's one of those things where you think back to all the people that helped

train you, all the people that supported you along the way," she said. "I think our national coordinator (of umpires) said it best that you want to be on the Łeld for the last pitch of the season. The opportunity to do that is humbling. it's very humbling."

When Florida State defeated Washington to win the national championship on June 5 in Oklahoma City, that's exactly where Erdahl was. The Minot native. Bismarck resident and recreation manager at Mandan Parks and Recreation Department also worked home plate twice in the College World Series, which was broadcast live on ESPN.

In true umpire fashion, Erdahl was focused on the task at hand on softball's biggest stage.

"It was a super intense atmosphere. Those teams have worked their whole lives to get there so



you're just trying to make sure you're on top of your game, stay out of the way and let the players decide it," Erdahl said. "Don't get me wrong, it was amazing to be there, but I think the enjoyment and rel ection of being there happens more so after it was over. In the moment, you're just trying to focus on every pitch and make sure to administer the game fairly."

Erdahl has 24 years umpiring experience. She began her career doing men's fastpitch softball in Minot. She received her Erst Division I assignment in 2008 and now primarily does Division I softball. She umpires about 40 games per season, mostly in the Big 10 Conference and American Athletic Conference. Prior to getting the World Series nod, she had worked NCAA regional and super regional

Getting the opportunity to um-

pire Division I games doesn't just happen.

"The process starts with being seen and for me that meant investing in going to camps where there are assignors and evaluators," she said.

Plenty of people have taken notice. In May, Erdahl was selected as one of 16 umpires from Eve countries to work the USA Softball International Cup in Irvine,

Erdahl is understated in talking about her achievements.

"You're only as good as your last call," she said. "Nothing is automatic or

guaranteed. You have to continue to improve and work hard."

Erdahl spends most spring weekends on the road, but has I exibility in her day job to make things work.

"I take vacation time, but my employer is very fair. Cole Higlin, our director, is very supportive," she said. "Mandan should get some credit. I love my job and the people I work with.'

Modern times also allow for getting work done away from the desk.

With technology, I can still work when I'm on the road," Erdahl said. "Whether it's answering emails or talking on the phone with sta , user groups or patrons, we do have the ability to work remotely."

Umpiring remains a very important part of her future.

As long as I feel passionate about it and feel like I can succeed and do it a high level, I'll keep plugging away," she said.

2017 USA Softball **Equipment Committee Review**

This past year the Equipment Committee, Dr. Lloyd Smith and the WSU lab have spent time on bat & ball compliance, as well as working with manufacturers in advance to make sure new designs and products meet our basic requirements of Rule 3 Section 1A.

We have worked extensively this past year to develop a process to identify and establish a USA Softball Non-Linear Bat Protocol and continue to work with manufacturers who seek an exemption to the barrel compression passing

It appears the 52/300 technology has been successful with the 11" ball and realize the same beneŁts of a signikcant reduction in the Impact Severity Index and the reduction in injuries when a ball strikes a player.

The Equipment Committee continues to study the 52/30012" ball for fast Pitch. Ball weight, diameter and seam height will also be an important factor to consider if a future change is proposed for the fast Pitch game.

USA Softball has invested in a new product called hight Scope. This produce will replace the Trackman Radar device to help with the equipment testing and Certilcation of bats and ball. We feel the I ight Scope product will give us real time data on many aspects of what the committee needs to make decisions on bats and balls, such as batted ball speed, swing speed, light of the ball and much more.

The information will be immediately available versus having to calculate the data from the Łeld which can be a time consuming exercise. By increasing OUll" understanding of how equipment performs and impacts our game, we will be able to better quantify how rule changes affect play. This will allow us to make decisions about softballs, bats, and the e ects of temperature on equipment. Added value to the Flight Scope will be a great training tool for the USA Softball program. This device will record pitch speed and location, for immediate feedback for umpires while calling pitches at a training camp. We will realize a valued relationship between the Equipment Testing and CertiŁcation Committee and the Umpire program, making the USA Softball program even stronger.

Dr. Smith and his lab continue to work on a number of projects in the lab such as prodUCing a Ncm-I..inear Bat Video for the USA Softball web site. Some of the other projects worked on by Dr. Smith is the continuation of the Reaction Time Łeld study which measures player reaction under game conditions. Information from this study will be valuable in making equipment decisions in the future. Reaction Time goals include, measuring acceptable risk, player perception of a batted ball, formulation of response time, and the determination of an average acceptable reaction time.

The lab continues research regarding rolled bat identification using nodestructive test methods. If the results of this research is successful, a formal test plan and implementation strategy will be proposed in the near future.

This past year we shared a very positive I..ong Range Planning survey taken at the 2016 Council meeting regarding equipment changes implemented the past few years.

It is also extremely important that we continue to work with our manufacturing partners as we collectively search for new ideas to improve equipment for the game of softball.

In 2018 the Equipment Committee plans will be to continue studying reaction time, improve the process to detect rolled bats, bat and ball compliance and continued lab and Łeld studies.

We appreciate the good work of Dr. Lloyd Smith and his lab at WSU. We recognize and thank the members of the Equipment Committee, Kevin Ryan, Rich Cress, Craig Cress and the entire USA Softball sta for their assistance this past year. As in the past, it is the duty of the Equipment Committee to make the very best decisions possible for the game of softball. We continue to base those decisions regarding bat and ball combinations and other related equipment, on the scientiŁc data we collect in an e ort to uphold the integrity of the game of softball.

The 43rd Annual Sam McQuade, Senior Charity Softball Tournament was Łnished on Sunday, June 24 in the rain. 
