

During this past season, your Board of Directors and Executive faced many challenges not limited to scheduling, eligibility, discipline, appeal events and, of course, rule interpretations. While it's easy to applaud their efforts, there were also events and issues that were not addressed properly. While we worked hard to carry the baggage from time to time, I would note that even our best efforts were at times frustrated by persons with their own agendas and lack of respect and interest in playing well with others. I believe the past two years of cultural upheaval due to the pandemic have left a gap in the trust and recognition of volunteerism in today's youth sport, but I also believe that by working together, we can get our brand of youth baseball back on track.

There are, though, more pressing issues overshadowing our own issues, which will be, at the least, changes to our governance, rules and policies brought about by the fallout from the recent events involving Hockey Canada regarding governance and Safe Sport policies (providing a safe place for youth athletes to participate). I would expect that compliance will be tied to funding and other criteria under Provincial control.

While the Hockey Canada issues has put a spotlight on youth sport at the National level (NSO), our Provincial representative (PSO), Baseball BC, has, over the last year, taken on the task of creating Safe Sport policies that their members, of which we are the largest, will need adopt and/or make our own.

I am going to ask for your support later under new business, to not only support the revision of our current rule book but to adopt, in whole or in part, the Baseball BC Safe Sport Policies and get ahead of the expected compliance. Member Associations will, I'm sure, at some time be expected to be compliant in these regards as well.

I trust that you will support your BCMBA Board of Directors and Executive in leading the way in making 2023 baseball a safe place for our athletes to participate and pursue their dreams.

As 2022 opened the year BCMBA and its member associations for the first time in a couple of years looked to move back to the "traditional" programming model that had not been seen on-field since the end of 2019.

Given the two years of baseball being under "Return to Play" (RTP) protocols there had been some issues given that programming for the most part was directly under the direction of BCMBA given the safety concerns and guidelines of participants within the province.

The concern at the outset of the preseason was turnover within member association boards and volunteers that may not have organized programming under the traditional model. BCMBA tried to communicate as best as possible to members the structure and provide information for members to communicate within particularly regional spring interlocks. Most regions were run and organized effectively. I again as noted in my reports throughout the year cannot stress enough the importance of planning from the start of 2023 regional interlocks. Of concern is the size of the Fraser Valley spring interlock which going forward is highly suggested to be reduced in half and more regional planning. Not what coaches or association representatives think is best for themselves vs all members. Economically it has become apparent that inflation has become a hot-button topic and BCMBA and all of its members should take into account the price of time and money for families to travel.

I would also like to make note of Howe Sound Minor Baseball and New West Baseball completing their first year of programming within BCMBA and look forward to their continued organizational growth moving forward as a member.

"On the ground" of concern was the astounding number of questions about rules all year from coaches. The BCMBA Rule Book is posted annually on the website along with previous editions and any mid-year Article XX rule changes. Members should promote within that volunteer members read through and understand. Many people look for quick answers without understanding them which can lead to misinterpretations. This year in particular more so than in recent memory.

I was also re-elected to the Baseball BC Board of Directors in 2022 and along with Grant Butler continue to represent BC Minor Baseball membership and our interests throughout the year.

I truly do appreciate the continued open dialogue and support from members for which I again served as your 1st Vice President.

INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

To the Member of B. C. Minor Baseball Association

I have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of B. C. Minor Baseball Association that comprise the statement of financial position as at August 31, 2022, and the statements of changes in net assets and receipts and disbursements for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO), and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Practitioner's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying financial statements based on my review. I conducted my review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require me to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, I do not express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

Basis for Qualified Conclusion

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Association derives partial receipts from fundraising activities and events, and dispenses cash for certain expenses incurred, the completeness of which is not susceptible to me obtaining evidence I considered necessary for the purpose of the review. Accordingly, the evidence obtained for these receipts and disbursements was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Association. Therefore, I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to fundraising receipts, disbursements, excess of receipts over disbursements, and cash flows from operations for the year ended August 31, 2022, current assets and net assets as at August 31, 2022.

Qualified Conclusion

Based on my review, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the *Basis for Qualified Conclusion* paragraph, nothing has come to my attention that causes me to believe that the financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of B. C. Minor Baseball Association as at August 31, 2022, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

1. DESCRIPTION OF THE ASSOCIATION

The association was incorporated as a Society under the "Societies Act" February 29, 1968 #7930 Amended November 17, 2012. The purpose of the association is to foster, improve and govern the game of baseball for their member associations in the Province of British Columbia, in accordance with the standard rules prescribed by the British Columbia Minor Baseball Association, and to institute and regulate competitions in all recognized divisions among its member associations.

2. REMUNERATION OF DIRECTORS

During the current year the association paid fees to two directors providing services to the Coaches Caravan Program. Fees paid totaled \$3,450.

Return to Regular Programming

This year presented several challenges outside the typical issues we see every season. For the most part, those challenges manifested from the lack of familiarity with rules and procedures. While there was a heavy focus on messaging the importance of reading and knowing the rules, many claimed ignorance as their first line of defence when infractions occurred.

With 98% of our support rooted in the charity of our volunteers, this is a legitimate dilemma. However, the truth is that based on the dwindling number of willing volunteers, we are often at the mercy of what any one individual is prepared to do regardless. Despite that reality, BC Minor Baseball and our Member Presidents must continue to promote understanding and conformity with respect to the rules and procedures.

Member Presidents and their boards are the foundation from which we deliver Youth Baseball programming in BC. With 18,000+ players and coaches Province-wide, maintaining the integrity of our rulebook is the difference between fair and competitive sport and unmanageable chaos. The governance relationship between the BCMBA Board of Directors and our Member Presidents is interdependent. As always, the greater good should always outweigh the short terms needs of any individual or a handful of Member Association(s).

Return to Standard Procedures

There seems to be an alarming trend borne out of the COVID-19 pandemic era. This trend sees an increasing number of individuals exhibiting poor behaviour and ignorance of, or disregard for, BCMBA dispute resolution procedures. The toll it takes on the BCMBA Board of Directors and our Member Associations' volunteers must be addressed. As it stands, it is not sustainable. Left unchecked, it will translate to fewer individuals willing to manage the league locally and Province-wide. Burnout is a genuine threat. This is in direct conflict with the growing needs of our member families and will undoubtedly result in the degradation of Youth Baseball in BC.

Messaging from both BCMBA and our Member Presidents should amplify around a couple of key points in this regard;

- All communication with the BCMBA Board of Directors should come through the Member Association
 President, or at the very least, with their consent. Presidents should only offer license if they support or
 endorse said communication.
- BCMBA adheres to the <u>Baseball BC Social Media Policy</u> and will act without hesitation regarding public attacks on any of our BCMBA brand Social Media platforms. This is not limited to Social Media but e-mail spam campaigns as well.

As we move toward the 2023 season, I encourage the focus of our leaders at the local and provincial levels to foster a healthy and cohesive example of how to deliver safe, fun, and enriching youth baseball programming. The ability to

collaborate has never been more valuable than it is today. Technology affords us the opportunity to meet and discuss challenges and changes. We should be looking to adapt regular President/BCMBA Executive discussion forums for resolution efforts. I am here to help facilitate that effort.

2022 was a steady year in Eligibility. The Eligibility committee thanks you for your patience during the 2022 season to get through the many requests needed to get our players on the field to play the greatest game. The following is the breakdown of the Eligibility committee;

Spring 133 releases

Spring 56 internal move up/down

Summer 37 releases

Summer 3 move-ups, all were not eligible to pitch, and one was due to an injury.

We, unfortunately, had to have nine investigations throughout the season for various rule violations.

- Rule 6.03 (G) not having tryout applications approved, which there were 6 of these violations alone.
- Rule 6.02 with not having player release forms approved.
- Rule 5.05 not having permission for a permanent move up.
- Rule 5.06 Temporary call ups
- Rule 12.01 players playing in other baseball programs (double rostered)

I am hoping we can clean these up for 2023 to have fewer investigations for violations from your rule book.

The discipline committee reviewed seventy incidents in 2022. While the majority were player and coach ejections resulting in a one-game suspension each, there were some more significant incidents.

Three ejections were the second for the offender in the season resulting in three, three and four games each.

There were seven incidents that resulted in supplemental discipline between three and seven-game suspensions.

The most alarming situation involved three spectators (all parents of youth athletes). The results of parents behaving badly were suspensions of one month, six weeks, and the remainder of the 2022 season.

Some of the incidents occurred with youth umpires managing the games, and there were probably many more incidents where the youth may have felt uncomfortable issuing an ejection when they should have. We had adults yelling, cursing, and intimidating CHILDREN doing their best to officiate baseball games. Just like our youth players, these umpires are learning and improving as they continue to give to the game. While all officials should receive respect, we must amend our culture so that we are not condoning this treatment of our youth umpires.

Unfortunately, we rarely hear about the good situations toward our officials, so to those players, coaches, spectators, and parents that continue to model good behaviour for our youth, I say thank you. But the recent culture in youth sports overall is alarming as adults continue to display behaviour that is completely inappropriate. While sports we watch on television may show fans, players and coaches behaving badly, we as ADULTS can choose to be better than what we might see during a professional sporting event.

Going forward, BC Minor Baseball, as a member of Baseball BC, should adopt the Baseball BC Safe Sport discipline policy. The Safe Sport policy sets out much more specific rules and consequences for inappropriate behaviour towards officials, including doubling all suspensions if they occur against a youth umpire. Initially, at the beginning of 2022, I was a member of the committee as the 13U & 18U Chair, respectively. Given changes on the board in January, I became co-chair of the High-Performance committee, which we were able to host a meeting early in the year to plan for the 2022 season as there was nothing previous to this after the AGM.

BCMBA high-performance camp for 16U Selects was once again planned with travel to Seattle for a summer tournament which included a 3-day player camp that led to team selection. A recommendation is to look at a year-end/Fall tourney instead of in-season to allow teams to travel for external tournaments that would be at the same time.

15U Selects did not move forward in 2022 due to tight timelines and BC Summer Games occurring mid-July.

13U looked at a new format from previous regional player ID sessions that will look to be introduced in 2023. Selects/Showcase, unfortunately, could not get this program going in 2022. With the local 13U A, AA Interlocks and 13U AAA scheduling varying and weather affecting completion spring schedules, it was decided to regroup and look to 2023.

James and Ron M. are currently building the HP page(s) on the website, which is an ongoing project to have a "hub" to promote BCMBA's high performance. The marketing committee is continually sourcing "partners" to work with in promoting our athletes. This is a multi-year project.

The Committee also advised the single-season team representatives (15U - 18U) of Baseball BC "pathways" for high-performance player opportunities for 14U through 18U for 2022. I also have provided information on the Baseball BC Qualifiers, Westerns and National Championships.

Somewhat frustrating again on BCMBA's part was the lack of year-end post-mortem feedback from some of the single-season divisions, which was to be brought to the High-Performance committee and, in turn, Fall Workshops for discussion points and any suggestions to make programming better with possible rule changes for 2023.

The year started off with travel to the ABCA to meet with ISG and talk to various coaches to participate in the upcoming Coaches Conference at the Langley Events Centre.

Given discussions with speakers at the ABCA conference, it was obvious that the 2022 Coaches Conference will be virtual once again on the same platform (HQ Enterprises) as in 2021 and bump the date of the conference to March 4-6. Again, saw increased registration for the conference with a great lineup of speakers, and most were also able to do a Q&A session.

In recapping the Coaches Conference attendees list, it was disappointing to see little interest from Vancouver Island and Interior regions, given no travel was involved to attend the virtual conference or participate in the discounted NCCP courses offered the week prior.

Baseball BC ran NCCP clinics throughout the year virtually that provided coaches with a platform to attend courses. This is something that local associations should be focusing on from the beginning of the year in regard to ensuring coaches have the correct credentials for the levels they coach, whether it be the single-season or split season.

There were many issues, as heard from division directors, that coaches did not have the correct NCCP designations come summer all-star season. Again, Baseball BC offers courses from essentially February onward throughout the year and required designations by divisions are listed in the BCMBA Rule Book, which is updated as per Baseball Canada's guidelines.

The Travelling Caravan again spent three weeks on the road covering almost all parts of the province: Lower Mainland/Fraser Valley, Vancouver Island, Interior and North regions. Had outstanding support from the host associations and tremendous participation at the events.

This was my first year as Chair of the 18U division. Two tiers of which are single-season; College Prep and AAA. With 18U AA running split spring and summer seasons.

During the pandemic, the College Prep division ran all teams that submitted applications, as the focus was keeping players on the field of play and providing a higher level of play. The season had eleven teams and was able to comple40-game game schedule, returning to a traditional year with its year-end Final Four Provincial tournament.

18U AAA had twelve teams declared for 2022, which is in and around a typical pre-pandemic season which was able to play a 34-game unbalanced schedule which included Prince George.

18U AA teams again participated in local spring interlocks and then again in the summer all-star season, leading to the five-team provincial championship.

An issue that came to my attention during the year was the lack of communication at times from BCMBA with teams which has been made note of and will be corrected moving forward in the single-season leagues as BCMBA does recognize this is a partnership between teams and the division.

2022 had 1,248 players, 2021 had 1,122, and 2019 had 1,374. Generally, we see a 30%+ reduction of player affiliation year-over-year between 15U and 18U.



Leading into the 2022 season, an Article XX vote was passed to have 13U AAA move under a single-season format based on association spring registration affiliation numbers. From the 13U AAA committee recommendations was the season was to be split in a spring developmental and summer all-star season. A number of rule changes occurred for this pilot season which follow-up and post mortem is to be provided by the 13U AAA Director.

13U A & AA ran as it had traditionally done so with regional interlock spring leagues that again led into the summer all-star season. 13U A again was able to host two Provincial Championships given the amount of declared teams and 13U AA hosted its ten-team provincial tournament as well. It is still very important for these two tiers within 13U to remain split season and developmental programming.

Please refer to the 13U A, AA & AAA directors reports for further detail.

Of note play affiliation for 13U in 2022 was 2,371 which was up from 2,067 in 2021 (RTP), but considerably down from 2019's 2,584 and 2018's 2,515. It is roughly a loss of approximately 25% year-over-year of player retention.

John Main Tournament

Given coming out of the pandemic, changes to 13U AAA and not knowing any trickledown effects this tournament once again for 2022 was to be hosted Labour Day weekend in Cowichan Valley. The tournament was essentially full and preparations in place for the tournament throughout the year until one-by-one teams started to withdraw basically right after the August long weekend to the point only five teams remained a week prior to the tournament to start.

A decision was made to cancel the tournament given the withdrawals and with such disappointment of not being supported as it has been traditionally.

For 2023 the host will once again be Cowichan Valley and the date will be moved back to the traditional May 25-28 weekend.

The teams competed through a short summer season to hopefully qualify for a chance to play in a provincial tournament. Of the 63 teams, 40 were able to compete in the 4 Provincial Tournaments from July 28 to 31. A BIG THANK YOU to our four host associations – Richmond, Mission, Cloverdale and Victoria – these tournaments do not happen without all the hard work of the host associations and their volunteer group.

Each provincial included an opening ceremony for the teams and a skills competition for players to show off their speed, power, and overall abilities before the gameplay began. All teams played four games over Friday and Saturday to hopefully advance to the semi-finals, plus a gold medal and a bronze medal game on Sunday.
