# U.S. OLYMPIC MEN'S HIGHLIGHTS



The 1932 Olympic Winter Games saw the tournament being held on U.S. soil for the first time and the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team didn't disappoint the home crowd. Team USA finished the tournament with a 4-1-1 record and claimed the silver medal.

After winning the silver medal at the two previous Olympics, the U.S. captured its first-ever gold medal at the VIII Olympic Winter Games. Team USA went through the tournament undefeated and capped off competition with victories over the Soviet Union and Czechoslovakia in the medal round.

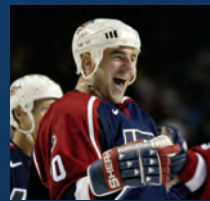


Team USA, made up of mostly college players, was a heavy underdog as it entered the 1980 Olympic Winter Games. In the semifinal round, the U.S. faced the favored Soviets. After heading into the third period trailing 3-2, the U.S. scored two goals and defeated the Soviets, 4-3, and the "Miracle on Ice" was completed. The U.S. topped Finland two days later to capture its second Olympic gold medal.

At the second Olympic Winter Games where National Hockey League players participated, legendary coach Herb Brooks, who led the Americans to gold in 1980, coached the U.S. to its first medal since the Olympic Winter Games in Lake Placid. The silver medal-winning performance marked the 10th time the U.S. captured an Olympic medal.

**USA HOCKEY, INC.**, is the National Governing Body for the sport of ice hockey in the United States. Its mission is to promote the growth of hockey in America and provide the best possible experience for all participants by encouraging, developing, advancing and administering the sport.

USA Hockey's primary emphasis is on the support and development of grassroots hockey programs. In January 2009, the organization launched the American Development Model, which - for the first time ever - provides associations nationwide with a blueprint for optimal athlete development.

While youth hockey is a main focus, USA Hockey also has vibrant junior and adult hockey programs that provide opportunities for players of all ability levels. The organization also supports a growing disabled hockey program and maintains an inline hockey program to provide structure and support for its growth across the nation.

Beyond serving those who play the game at the amateur level, USA Hockey has certification programs for coaches and officials to ensure education standards are met that coincide with the level of play. Furthermore, a large focus is put on parent education with equipment needs, rules of the

game and parental roles in youth sports among common topics.

Members of the organization are entitled to many benefits, including a subscription to *USA Hockey Magazine*, the most widely circulated hockey publication in the world; excess accident, general liability and catastrophic insurance coverage; access to USAHockey.com; and opportunities to participate in USA Hockey National Championships, as well as player development camps.

USA Hockey is the official representative to the United States Olympic Committee and the International Ice Hockey Federation. In this role, USA Hockey is responsible for organizing and training men's and women's teams for international tournaments, including the IIHF World Championships, and the Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games. Closer to home, USA Hockey works closely with the National Hockey League and the National Collegiate Athletic Association on matters of mutual interest.

USA Hockey is divided into 12 geographical districts throughout the United States. Each district has a registrar to register teams; a referee-in-chief to register officials and organize clinics; a coach-in-chief to administer education program for coaches; a risk manager to oversee liability and safety programs; and a skill development program administrator to facilitate learn-to-play programs for youth players and their parents.

## XXI OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES

### TOURNAMENT FORMAT

#### PRELIMINARY ROUND

Twelve teams will participate in the Preliminary Round of the XXI Olympic Winter Games ice hockey tournament. The 12 teams will be divided into three groups (A, B and C) consisting of four teams each.

- Group A:** Canada, USA, Switzerland, Norway
- Group B:** Russia, Czech Republic, Slovakia, Latvia
- Group C:** Sweden, Finland, Belarus, Germany

Competition during the Preliminary Round will feature a round-robin tournament, with each team playing three games against teams within its group. Following the 18-game Preliminary Round, all 12 teams will be ranked together in one group (D).

#### QUALIFICATION ROUND

After the teams have been ranked together, the top four teams (D1, D2, D3, D4) will receive a bye to the Quarterfinal Round. The eight remaining teams will begin a single-elimination crossover format (Feb. 23) — No. 5 vs. No. 12 (winner becomes E1); No. 6 vs. No. 11 (E2); No. 7 vs. No. 10 (E3); No. 8 vs. No. 9 (E4). The winning teams will advance to the Quarterfinals while the losing teams will be ranked 9-12 according to their ranking after the Preliminary Round.

#### QUARTERFINAL ROUND

In the Quarterfinal Round (Feb. 24), games will be played with the following matchups:

- D1 vs. E4** (winner becomes F1)
- D2 vs. E3** (winner becomes F2)
- D3 vs. E2** (winner becomes F3)
- D4 vs. E1** (winner becomes F4)

The winning teams will advance to the Semifinal Round while the losing teams will be ranked 5-8 according to their ranking after the Preliminary Round.

#### SEMIFINAL ROUND

The Semifinal Round (Feb. 26) will feature F1 vs. F4 and F2 vs. F3. The two winning teams will advance to the gold-medal game and the two losing teams will play in the bronze-medal game.

#### MEDAL GAMES

The home teams for both the bronze-medal (Feb. 27) and gold-medal (Feb. 28) games will be the higher ranked teams as determined at the conclusion of the Preliminary Round.

#### THREE-POINT SYSTEM

For the 2010 Olympic Winter Games, points shall be awarded as follows:

- Three points for a regulation win.
- One point for a tie at the end of regulation.
- One additional point for overtime wins during the five-minute overtime period or to the winning team after the Game Winning Shots Procedure if still tied after the overtime period.

### MEDIA GUIDELINES

Players and coaches of the 2010 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team will be available for interviews based on the following schedule. Please note that all media availability will occur at Canada Hockey Place unless otherwise notified:

**Non-Game Day Practices:** Players and coaches will be available following each non-game day practice for a period of 15 minutes. When practices occur at Britannia Centre, media availability will occur at Canada Hockey Place upon the team's return to the facility.

**Post-Game:** Team USA Head Coach Ron Wilson will participate in a post-game press conference following each United States game. In addition, Team USA players will be available for interviews in the mixed zone for a period of up to one-half hour following each U.S. game.

Requests for interviews at times other than those specified above should be forwarded to either Dave Fischer (719-684-5940/778-938-1952) or Gerry Helper (778-938-2841/615-642-7106) of the U.S. communications staff.

International Olympic Committee regulations stipulate that dressing rooms are closed to the media during the Olympic Winter Games.

## BRIAN BURKE

### GENERAL MANAGER

**BRIAN BURKE** is making his first Olympic appearance and is serving as the general manager of the 2010 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team.

Burke most recently served as the general manager of the U.S. Men's National Team at the 2009 International Ice Hockey Federation World Men's Championship in Bern and Zurich-Kloten, Switzerland. He was also the general manager for the U.S. Men's National Team at the 1993 IIHF World Men's Championship in Munich and Dortmund, Germany.



Burke's full-time job is as the president and general manager of the National Hockey League's Toronto Maple Leafs, a position he accepted on Nov. 29, 2008, after previously serving as the executive vice president and general manager of the NHL's Anaheim Ducks for three seasons (2005-08). While in Anaheim, Burke led the Ducks to their first-ever Stanley Cup in 2007, the first for a team from California. Additionally, the Ducks made the Stanley Cup Playoffs in each of Burke's seasons with the organization.

Burke went to Anaheim after a six-year stint (1998-2004) as president and general manager of the Vancouver Canucks, revitalizing the team and community en route to consecutive 100+ point seasons and a Northwest Division title in 2003-04.

Under his leadership, the team increased its point total four consecutive years from 1999-2003. Over his last four seasons with the team, Burke engineered four consecutive seasons of at least 90 points. For his efforts, Burke was named by *The Sporting News* as NHL Executive of the Year in 2001.

Prior to joining the Canucks organization, Burke worked in the NHL front office as senior vice president and director of hockey operations from 1993-98. While at the league office, he served as the chief disciplinarian, ruling on violations for on-ice player conduct. He worked closely with Commissioner Gary Bettman on league direction, including collective bargaining matters.

The Edina, Minn., native was honored with the Lester Patrick Award in 2008 for outstanding service to hockey in the United States. Burke's immediate family includes his wife, Jennifer, and six children, Katie, Patrick, Brendan, Molly, Mairin and Gracie.

**DAVID POILE** is making his first appearance with a U.S. Olympic Team, however, has been involved with the U.S. programs over the course of his distinguished career.

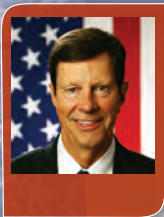
On the international stage, Poile most recently served as associate general manager for the U.S. Men's National Team at the 2009 International Ice Hockey Federation World Men's Championship. Additionally, he was the general manager for both the 1998 and 1999 and U.S. Men's National Teams.

Poile's full-time job is as the president of hockey operations and general manager of the National Hockey League's Nashville Predators. He has 27 consecutive years of experience as an NHL general manager, ranking as the second-longest current streak in the league and sixth in NHL history.

Prior to his time in Nashville, Poile led the NHL's Washington Capitals to the Stanley Cup Playoffs 14 times during his 15-year tenure.

In 2005, Poile was selected as one of four NHL general managers to sit on the first NHL competition committee. # JIM JOHANNSON

## ASSISTANT EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, HOCKEY OPERATIONS

**JIM JOHANNSON**, assistant executive director of hockey operations for USA Hockey, is serving on the staff of his third U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team.

A two-time U.S. Olympian as a player (1988, 1992), Johansson brings extensive experience in international ice hockey as both a player and administrator. In 2002, Johansson served as team leader for the silver medal-winning U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team at the Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah, and was the senior director of hockey operations for Team USA at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Torino, Italy.

Johansson joined USA Hockey's national office on Sept. 1, 2000, as manager of international activities and U.S. Olympic Committee relations. He was promoted to senior director of hockey operations, a newly created position, on Aug. 5, 2003. On June 25, 2007, Johansson was elevated to assistant executive director of hockey operations and is responsible for the day-to-day management and integration of all in-sport related initiatives. He handles USA Hockey representation in obtaining players and coaches for national teams in international competition. In addition, Johansson interfaces with the USOC on matters of mutual interest.

He has worked with 10 U.S. National Junior Teams, including the gold-medal-winning 2010 U.S. National Junior Team. He was also the lead administrator in hosting the 2005 IIHF World Junior Championship in Grand Folks, N.D., and Thief River Falls, Minn., and served as team leader for the gold medal-winning 2004 U.S. National Junior Team.

A former U.S. National Team member, Johansson spent five years as the general manager of the Twin Cities Vulcans, a Junior A team in the United States Hockey League. Under his guidance, the Vulcans captured the 2000 USA Hockey Junior A National Championship in Green Bay, Wis.

Johansson, a native of Rochester, Minn., played nine seasons in the International Hockey League, splitting time among three teams. His most productive campaign came in 1988-89, when he tallied 75 points (35-40) in 82 games with the Salt Lake City Golden Eagles.

Prior to embarking on his professional career, Johansson played at the University of Wisconsin, where he helped the Badgers capture the 1983 NCAA Division I National Championship.

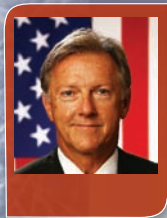

The 2010 Olympic Winter Games marks the second time Wilson will lead Team USA at the Olympics, having served as head coach at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games in Nagano, Japan.

On the international side, Wilson has been Team USA's head coach for some of its brightest moments, including leading Team USA to the inaugural World Cup of Hockey championship in 1996. Wilson also directed the U.S. Men's National Team that captured the bronze medal at the 1996 International Ice Hockey Federation World Men's Championship in Vienna, Austria. The medal was the first for the United States in an A-Pool IIHF World Men's Championship since 1962 (excluding Olympic years), when the U.S. also earned the bronze.

Wilson also led the U.S. Men's National Team to fourth-place finishes at the 2009 IIHF World Men's Championship in Bern and Zurich-Kloten, Switzerland, and the 1994 IIHF World Men's Championship in Bolzano, Canazei, and Milan, Italy.

He also served as head coach of Team USA at the 2004 World Cup of Hockey.

Wilson has been involved with USA Hockey since the mid-1970s, having played for the U.S. Men's National Team at four (1975, 1981, 1983, 1987) IIHF World Men's Championships. He also captained the 1988 U.S. Men's Select Team that captured the championship of the prestigious Spengler Cup in Davos, Switzerland.

Prior to joining the Maple Leafs, Wilson was the head coach of the NHL's San Jose Sharks for parts of five seasons. Under his direction, the Sharks were the only NHL team to have won at least one playoff series from 2004-08, reaching the Western Conference Finals for the first time in 2004, and the Western Conference Semifinals in 2007 and 2008.

Wilson also coached the Washington Capitals from 1997-2002, compiling a 192-167-51 record. His tenure was highlighted by the team's only trip to the Stanley Cup Final in 1998.

Prior to spending five seasons with the Capitals, Wilson served as the first head coach of the expansion Mighty Ducks of Anaheim in 1993, leading the team to the postseason for the first time during the 1996-97 season.

In 14 full NHL seasons as a head coach, Wilson's teams have reached the postseason eight times; won four division titles; appeared in the Stanley Cup Final once; reached 90 points seven times and 100 points four times; and reached at least 40 wins seven times and 50 wins once.

Wilson played in 117 career NHL games with the Maple Leafs and Minnesota North Stars. He recorded 26 goals and 67 assists for 93 points.

Prior to his time in the NHL, Wilson played four years (1973-77) of college hockey at Providence College. He was an All-America selection twice and a four-time All-ECAC selection. As a sophomore, he was named ECAC Player of the Year, leading the nation in 87 points (26-61) in only 26 games. A member of the Providence

Athletic Hall of Fame, Wilson still holds the school records (and NCAA records for a defenseman) in career points (250), career assists (172), points in a season (87) and single-season assists (61).

Wilson and his wife, Maureen, have two daughters, Lauren and Kristin.

# JOHN TORTORELLA

ASSISTANT COACH

**JOHN TORTORELLA**, the all-time wins leader by an American-born head coach in the National Hockey League, is in his second season as head coach of the New York Rangers after being named to the position on Feb. 23, 2009.

As part of USA Hockey, Tortorella served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team at the 2008 International Ice Hockey Federation World Men's Championship in Halifax and Quebec City, Canada, and the 2005 IIHF World Men's Championship in Vienna and Innsbruck, Austria.

An 18-year NHL coaching veteran, Tortorella was the head coach of the Tampa Bay Lightning for parts of seven seasons (2001-04, 2005-08), leading the team to its first-ever Stanley Cup during the 2003-04 campaign. He is one of only five American-born NHL coaches to have won the Stanley Cup and was named the recipient of the Jack Adams Award, presented to the league's top coach, following the Lightning's championship season. During the 2003-04 season, the team set franchise records with 46 wins and 106 points, while winning its first-ever Eastern Conference title and second consecutive Southeast Division crown.

Tortorella joined the Lightning as an associate coach for the 2000-01 season before being elevated to head coach in January 2001.

A Boston native, Tortorella began his playing career at Salem State College before transferring to the University of Maine. He spent three seasons with the Black Bears and was twice named an ECAC All-Star.

After playing in Sweden, Tortorella skated in the Atlantic Coast Hockey League with Virginia, Hampton Roads and Erie. He spent two seasons as the general manager and head coach of the Virginia Lancers (ACHL) from 1986-88, where he garnered coach of the year honors during both campaigns and led his 1986-87 team to the league championship.

In 1988-89, Tortorella was hired as an assistant coach with the New Haven Nighthawks of the American Hockey League. He became an assistant coach with the Buffalo Sabres the following year and remained with the Sabres organization through the 1996-97 season. The Sabres named him head coach of their AHL affiliate, the Rochester Americans, prior to the 1995-96 campaign. His Rochester team won the Calder Cup in 1996 and followed that up with the best record in the AHL's North Division during the 1996-97 regular season.

Tortorella returned to the NHL in 1997 as an assistant with the Phoenix Coyotes, where he spent two seasons before joining the New York Rangers for 1999-2000. He served as the Rangers' interim head coach for the final four games of the season.

Tortorella and his wife, Jennifer, have two children, Brittany and Dominick.



# SCOTT GORDON

ASSISTANT COACH

**SCOTT GORDON**, who is in his second season as the head coach of the National Hockey League's New York Islanders, is on a U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team staff for the first time.

Gordon most recently served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team at the 2009 International Ice Hockey Federation World Men's Championship. He was also a member of the 1992 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team that competed at the Olympic Winter Games in Albertville, France.

In 2007-08, Gordon led the Providence Bruins of the American Hockey League to a league-best 55-18-3 mark and earned the Louis A.R. Pieri Memorial Award as AHL Coach of the Year.

After spending two full seasons (2000-02) as an assistant coach at Providence, Gordon was promoted to head coach in his third season for the final nine games of the 2002-03 regular season and playoffs. He then spent the next five seasons as the head coach of Providence, leading the team to a record of 221-141-20-27 (W-L-T-OT/SOL).

Gordon began his coaching career with the International Hockey League's Atlanta Knights from 1994-96, and then spent two seasons (1996-98) with the IHL's Quebec Rafales. When Gordon was named head coach of the Knights on Jan. 5, 1996, he became the youngest head coach in the league's 53-year history at 32 years of age.

Gordon's next move came in 1998-99, when he was named the head coach of the Roanoke Express of the East Coast Hockey League. He led the club to consecutive first-place finishes in the Northeast Division, while compiling an 82-42-16 regular-season record. The 1999-2000 Express set franchise records for wins (44), points (94) and fewest goals against (181).

A native of Easton, Mass., Gordon was a goaltender for Boston College from 1982-86, posting a career mark of 64-35-3. He backstopped the Eagles to an NCAA Frozen Four appearance in 1985 and was named a Hockey East First-Team All-Star in 1986. He helped Boston College finish in first place in the ECAC East Region in 1983-84 before leading it to first-place finishes in Hockey East in 1984-85 and 1985-86.

Gordon began his professional playing career in 1986-87 when he signed with the Quebec Nordiques. He made his NHL debut in 1989-90 with Quebec and played a total of 23 career NHL games, all with the Nordiques. He also holds the distinction of being the first ECHL graduate to play in the NHL.

Gordon and his wife, Jennifer, have two sons, Erik and Ryan.





## MIKE ALDRICH

### EQUIPMENT MANAGER

**MIKE ALDRICH**, who is on a Team USA staff for the fourth time, is in his 14th season as equipment manager for the National Hockey League's San Jose Sharks.

Aldrich also served as Team USA's equipment manager at two International Ice Hockey Federation World Men's Championships (2003, 2005) and the 2004 World Cup of Hockey.

With the Sharks, Aldrich oversees the entire operation of the equipment staff, as well as handling player requests regarding equipment, skate sharpening needs, purchasing orders, inventory control and distribution for all equipment throughout the season.

Prior to joining the Sharks, Aldrich was the equipment manager for the team's International Hockey League affiliate, the Kansas City Blades, for three seasons (1993-95). He also worked at Michigan Tech University as the school's equipment manager and athletic purchasing agent from 1989-93.

Aldrich and his wife, Susie, have two grown sons, Brad and Jason.



## DEREK SETTLEMYRE

### EQUIPMENT MANAGER

**DEREK SETTLEMYRE**, a member of the National Hockey League's Philadelphia Flyers organization since 1996, is on his first U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team staff.

Settlemyre spent the 2008-09 season as the head equipment manager for the Flyers, and worked with their American Hockey League affiliate, the Philadelphia Phantoms, since the team's inception in 1996.

Prior to joining the Phantoms, Settlemyre worked as an assistant equipment manager with the Florida Panthers and the Flyers.

Settlemyre resides in Pine Hill, N.J., with his two daughters, Peyton and Bryce.





## STAN WONG

### ATHLETIC TRAINER

**STAN WONG**, who is on the staff of a U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team for the second time, brings a wealth of experience to USA Hockey.

He previously served as an athletic trainer for the U.S. Men's National Team at the 2009 International Ice Hockey Federation World Men's Championship, as well as the U.S. National Junior Team for eight consecutive years (2003-10). He also worked with Team USA at the 2007 Deutschland Cup in Hannover, Germany, and the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Torino, Italy.

Wong served as the athletic trainer for both the Washington Capitals (1986-99) and the Florida Panthers (1999-2002) of the National Hockey League and, in 1991 and 1999, Wong earned the honor of being named athletic trainer for the NHL All-Star Game.

In addition to a Stanley Cup Final appearance with Washington during the 1997-98 season, Wong also served as an athletic trainer at Super Bowl XV for the Philadelphia Eagles and for the United States Football League's Boston Breakers (1983-85).

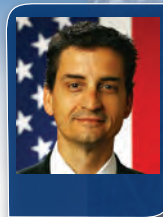

## DR. MICHAEL STUART

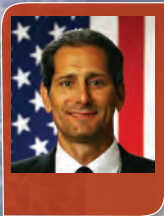
### TEAM PHYSICIAN

## BRUCE LIFRIERI

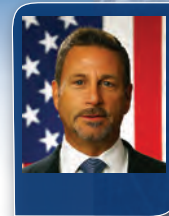
### MESSAGE THERAPIST

# BRAD ALDRICH

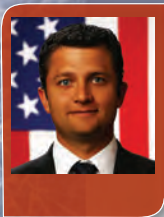
## VIDEO COORDINATOR

#### SUMMARY

In the first Olympic Winter Games on U.S. soil since the 1980 Olympic Winter Games in Lake Placid, N.Y., Team USA did not disappoint the home crowd. After blanking Finland, 6-0, in Team USA's first game, the U.S. tied Russia, 2-2, before garnering an 8-1 victory against Belarus to close out preliminary-round play. After defeating Germany, 5-0, in the quarterfinal round, the U.S. knocked off Russia, 3-2, in a rematch in the semifinals. In a hard-fought gold-medal game, the U.S. dropped a 5-2 decision to Canada to claim the silver medal, the United States' first medal since winning gold in 1980.

After dropping a 4-2 decision in the team's first game, the U.S. responded by knocking off Belarus, 5-2. Team USA would then lose to Canada, 4-1, before falling to eventual gold medalist Czech Republic by an identical score in the quarterfinal round.

## TOURNAMENT FORMAT

Eight teams will participate in the XI Olympic Winter Games, separated into two groups (A and B) based on seeding. The teams will compete in a 20-game schedule, with 12 preliminary round games, four final classification games, two semifinal games, one bronze-medal game and one gold-medal game.

## PRELIMINARY ROUND

Competition during the preliminary round (Feb. 13-18) will follow a round-robin tournament format, with each team playing three games within its group. Following the round robin, teams will be ranked within their respective group based upon the points they accumulate in the round.

- Three points shall be awarded for the winning team at the conclusion of regulation.
- One point will be awarded to both teams at the conclusion of regulation if the game is tied.
- An additional point shall be awarded for the team winning the game in the five-minute overtime period, or the game-winning shots procedure if the game is still tied following the conclusion of the overtime period.

## PLAYOFF ROUND

All eight teams will advance to the playoff round (Feb. 20 & 22). The top two teams in each group advance to the medal round, while the third- and fourth-place teams from each group will play for positions five through eight in the final classification games. The four teams that advance to the medal round will first play in the semifinal games (Feb. 22), which are a single-elimination crossover format — the first-ranked team from Group A plays the second-ranked team from Group B and vice versa. The winners from the semifinal games will advance to the gold-medal game (Feb. 25), while the losers of the semifinal games will play for the bronze medal (Feb. 25). Meanwhile, the four teams that advance to the final

classification games will also play in a crossover format — the third-ranked team from Group A plays the second-ranked team from Group B and vice versa. The winners advance to the fifth-place game (Feb. 22), while the losers will play in the seventh-place game (Feb. 22).

## OVERTIME PROCEDURES

- If a preliminary round game is tied after three periods, a five-minute four-on-four sudden-death overtime period shall be played immediately after an intermission of three minutes. The teams will defend the same goals as in the third period.
- If a playoff game is tied after three periods, a 10-minute four-on-four sudden-death overtime period shall be played immediately after an intermission of three minutes. The teams will defend the same goals as in the third period.
- If the gold-medal game is tied after three periods, a 20-minute four-on-four sudden-death overtime will start immediately after a 15-minute intermission during which time the ice will be cleaned. The teams will change ends.
- If no goal is scored in the overtime period of any game, the Game-Winning Shots Procedure will apply.

## GAME-WINNING SHOTS PROCEDURE

Shots will be taken at both ends of the ice surface. Three players from each team will take shots alternately until a decisive goal is scored. If the score is still tied after three shots by each team, the procedure will continue with a tiebreak sudden-death shoot-out by one player from each team. The teams may use the same player or new players for each shot in the tiebreak shoot-out, until the outcome is decided.

# WOMEN'S TEAM STAFF



## GENERAL MANAGER

**MICHELE AMIDON** began her duties as USA Hockey's first-ever director of women's hockey in August 2006. She is responsible for the management of the women's national team program, including development efforts of both coaches and players.

In early 2008, after Amidon had been in her role with the National Governing Body for just a year and a half, Team USA captured gold medals at both the International Ice Hockey Federation World Women's U18 Championship and the IIHF World Women's Championship. Then, at the 2008 Women's Four Nations Cup, Team USA earned its first championship since 2003. In 2009, both the U.S. Women's National Under-18 Team and the U.S. Women's National Team successfully defended their World titles.

A former U.S. Women's National Team player, Amidon spent eight seasons (1998-2006) as the highly successful head coach of the Bowdoin College women's ice hockey team prior to joining USA Hockey's national office staff.

During her nine seasons at Bowdoin — eight as head coach and one as an assistant coach — Amidon led the Polar Bears to unrivaled success. She guided the team to a 140-52-12 overall record, which included four NCAA tournament appearances, two New England Small College Athletic Conference championships and four NESCAC championship-game appearances.

Bowdoin began its rise to national prominence during the 2001-02 season, a year in which Amidon guided the Polar Bears to a school-record 23 victories, the NESCAC championship and the school's first-ever appearance in the NCAA tournament. For her efforts, she was honored as the NESCAC Coach of the Year.

The 2002-03 campaign brought even more success, as Amidon guided Bowdoin back to the NCAA tournament and a third-place national finish. That year, she was named both the NCAA Division III Coach of the Year by the American Hockey Coaches Association and the NESCAC Coach of the Year.

Amidon also has coaching experience at the international level, having served as assistant coach with the U.S. National Women's 22 & Under Team that competed in the 1999 Christmas Cup in Fussen, Germany. In addition, she has been involved as a head coach at USA Hockey's Player Development Camps on several occasions.

Amidon has a multitude of international playing experience on her resume, including winning a silver medal as a member of the U.S. Women's National Team at the 1992 IIHF World Women's Championship.

A 1994 graduate of St. Lawrence University, Amidon was a four-year letter winner and three-year captain of the SLU women's ice hockey team. In her first year with the team, she was voted ECAC Rookie and Division III Player of the Year. Named the ECAC Most Valuable Player as a junior and to the ECAC All-Star Team her senior campaign, Amidon was a three-time MVP of the St. Lawrence team.

Amidon resides in Colorado Springs, Colo., with her partner, Suzanne Johnson.





## HEAD COACH

**MARK JOHNSON** is among the most accomplished coaches in the world today.

Johnson has been involved as a head coach in the U.S. Women's National Program the past three years. Most recently, he guided the 2009-10 U.S. Women's National Team during its pre-Olympic season that included the Qwest Tour, the 2009 Hockey Canada Cup, the 2009 Four Nations Cup and various other games throughout the U.S. and Canada. The 2009 Hockey Canada Cup resulted in a championship for the U.S., while the 2009 Four Nations Cup saw the Americans garner a second-place finish.

In January of 2009, he guided the U.S. National Under-18 Team to the gold medal at the International Ice Hockey Federation World Women's U18 Championship. He followed by leading the U.S. Women's National Team to gold at the IIHF World Women's Championship just three months later.

Johnson also served as head coach for the U.S. Women's Under-22 Select Team in 2007-08 and piloted Team USA to a second-place finish at the 2006 Four National Cup, as well as the silver medal at the 2007 IIHF World Women's Championship.

Prior to working with the women, Johnson twice served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team in the IIHF Men's World Championship (2000, 2002) and also was an assistant coach at the 2001 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Orientation Camp.

Beyond his numerous roles with Team USA, Johnson is the head women's ice hockey coach at the University of Wisconsin. There, Johnson has taken

the Badger program to national prominence in his first six years at the helm. Under his guidance, the Badgers have advanced to the NCAA championship game in each of the past four seasons and captured the title in three of those years (2006, 2007, 2009). Since the 2005-06 campaign, Wisconsin has recorded 135 wins, more than any other team in the nation.

The 2006, 2007 and 2009 Western Collegiate Hockey Association Coach of the Year and American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year, Johnson led the Badgers to back-to-back WCHA regular season, playoff and NCAA championships, while winning more games (72) in a two-year period (2005-07) than any other team in women's college hockey history. During the 2006-07 campaign, Johnson's team broke or tied 18 NCAA team and individual records, including wins in a season (36), fewest losses (one), best winning percentage (.927) and most shutouts (18). Johnson leads all active women's college hockey coaches with an .880 winning percentage after compiling a record of 210-19-22 in his first six years at Wisconsin.

Prior to his time on the Wisconsin women's bench, Johnson served as an assistant coach with the UW men's ice hockey program from 1996-02. In addition, Johnson coached professionally, directing the Colonial Hockey League-expansion Madison Monsters to a 37-30-7 mark in the 1995-96 season and earning CHL Coach of the Year honors.

Meanwhile, Johnson has represented the United States as a player in 13 international tournaments, including eight World Championships. Most notably, he led the 1980 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team to the gold

medal, tallying a team-leading 11 points, including two goals in the "Miracle On Ice" game against the Soviet Union.

Additionally, Johnson played at the University of Wisconsin, where he garnered WCHA Rookie of the Year honors in 1977 and went on to become the school's second all-time leading scorer with 256 points, including a still-standing school-record 125 goals in just three seasons. He was a two-time All-America selection (1978, 1979) and earned league MVP accolades in 1979.

Johnson enjoyed an 11-year National Hockey League career, during which time he racked up 508 points in 669 games. He enjoyed stints with the Pittsburgh Penguins, Minnesota North Stars, Hartford Whalers, St. Louis Blues and New Jersey Devils.

Among his numerous accolades throughout the years, Johnson, the son of legendary coach Bob Johnson, is a member of the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame and the IIHF Hall of Fame.

Johnson, a native of Madison, Wis., earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Wisconsin in 1994. He resides in Verona, Wis., with his wife, Leslie.

The couple has five children, Doug (2/24/84), Chris (11/3/85), Patrick (4/21/89), Mikayla (8/15/94) and Megan (1/15/97). Doug is the head coach for the Wisconsin Ice Spirit Girls' U14 hockey team, Chris is a senior captain for the Augsburg College men's ice hockey team, Patrick is a junior on the UW men's ice hockey team and Mikayla and Megan play hockey for the Wisconsin Ice Spirit Girls' U14 and U12 teams, respectively.



## DAVE FLINT

**DAVE FLINT**, head coach of the Northeastern University women's ice hockey team, is in his third season on the staff of the U.S. Women's National Program.

In 2009-10, he was on staff during the 2009-10 U.S. Women's National Team pre-Olympic season that included the Qwest Tour, the 2009 Hockey Canada Cup, the 2009 Four Nations Cup and various other games throughout the U.S. and Canada. The 2009 Hockey Canada Cup resulted in a championship for the U.S., while the 2009 Four Nations Cup saw the Americans garner a second-place finish.

In November 2008, Flint was an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's Select Team at the 2008 Four Nations Cup, where Team USA took home its first championship since 2003. Then, in April 2009, he served in the same role as the U.S. Women's National Team captured the gold medal at the IIHF World Women's Championship.

The 2009-10 season marks the third year of Flint serving as the goaltending consultant for the entire U.S. Women's National Program. At the 2008 IIHF World Women's Championship, he was on hand as the U.S. garnered its second-ever gold medal.

Before being named Northeastern's head coach prior to the 2008-09 season, Flint spent five years as head coach at St. Anselm College in Manchester, N.H., where he compiled an 88-15-2 (.848) record. Flint arrived at St. Anselm in 2003 to take over a club team making the transition to varsity status, and he made it an immediate winner. In 2007-08, the Hawks posted their fourth straight 20-win season with a 23-2-1 record, which included a 17-1-1 mark in the ECAC East to secure first place. In their four seasons as a varsity team under Flint, the Hawks won two ECAC East regular season championships and three ECAC Open Tournament championships. Flint was recognized as ECAC East Coach of the

Year and a finalist for National Coach of the Year three consecutive seasons from 2006-08. Because of its status as a non-scholarship Division II institution, St. Anselm was not eligible to compete in the ECAC East Tournament or the NCAA Division III Tournament.

Flint produced three ECAC East Players of the Year, two ECAC East Rookies of the Year, one ECAC East Goalie of the Year, one First Team All-American and three Second Team All-Americans.

Prior to his success with the women's hockey program, Flint served as assistant coach of the St. Anselm men's ice hockey team for seven seasons. During his tenure, Flint was responsible for recruiting and coordinating the team's defense and goaltending. The Hawks won back-to-back ECAC Division II Championships from 2000-01. A certified athletic trainer and strength & conditioning specialist, Flint was also the assistant athletic trainer at St. Anselm.

From 1999-2008, Flint also worked at the Superskills Training Center in Tewksbury, Mass., as the director of off-ice conditioning and assistant to the director of on-ice instruction. At Superskills, Flint helped instruct and train both collegiate and professional goaltenders, including NHL goalies Peter Skudra, Andrew Raycroft and Scott Clemmensen. He now works with Stop It Goaltending in Woburn, Mass., as an on-ice instructor.

A 1993 graduate of North Adams State College (now the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts), Flint received his bachelor's degree in biology with a concentration in sports medicine. Flint was a four-year goaltender on the varsity men's ice hockey team at North Adams State and was named the team's MVP as a senior.

He and his wife, Alison, have two children, Paige and Tate. They reside in Merrimack, N.H.



## JODI MCKENNA

### ASSISTANT COACH

**JODI MCKENNA**, head women's ice hockey coach at Wesleyan University, has been working with the U.S. Women's National Program the last two seasons.

In 2009-10, she was on staff during the 2009-10 U.S. Women's National Team pre-Olympic season that included the Qwest Tour, the 2009 Hockey Canada Cup, the 2009 Four Nations Cup and various other games throughout the U.S. and Canada. The 2009 Hockey Canada Cup resulted in a championship for the U.S., while the 2009 Four Nations Cup saw the Americans garner a second-place finish.

McKenna held the same role at the 2009 International Ice Hockey Federation World Women's Championship, where Team USA earned the gold medal. Previously, she served as an assistant coach at the 2008 USA Hockey Women's Under-22 Camp and at the 2008 USA Hockey Women's Holiday Camp.

McKenna has served for two seasons as the head coach at Wesleyan after spending nine seasons as an assistant coach at St. Lawrence University. In her nine seasons with St. Lawrence, she helped the Saints qualify for the NCAA tournament five times, making it to the Frozen Four on each occasion and playing in the title game in 2001.

A 1998 graduate of Brown University, McKenna played four seasons for the Bears, and helped the team capture an ECAC regular-season or tournament title three times. In her senior year, Brown played in the first-ever women's ice hockey national championship game, where the Bears fell to the University of New Hampshire.

A certified strength and conditioning coach, McKenna developed and monitored the year-round training program of the St. Lawrence women's ice hockey squad.

After receiving her bachelor's degree from Brown in 1998, McKenna added a master's degree from St. Lawrence in 2000.

She resides in Middletown, Conn., and is engaged to Kevin Cunningham.





# TEENA MURRAY

## STRENGTH & CONDITIONING COACH



**TEENA MURRAY**, who is the director of Olympic sports performance at the University of Louisville, has been the strength and conditioning coach for the U.S. Women's National Program since 2006. During each of the last four seasons, she has worked year-round with the athletes and provided programs to help them achieve peak performance.

During her time with USA Hockey, Murray has accompanied Team USA to three Women's Four Nations Cups (2006, 2007, 2008) and the 2007 and 2009 International Ice Hockey Federation World Women's Championships. In addition, she has been involved in every training camp during the last four years, including the USA Hockey Women's Holiday Camp, as well as the Women's National Festival. She has recently been based in Blaine, Minn., with the 2009-10 U.S. Women's National Team during its centralization.

### EQUIPMENT MANAGER

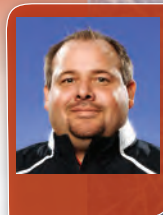

## GERRY HELPER

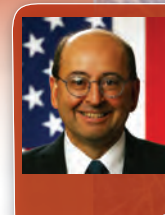
### COMMUNICATIONS

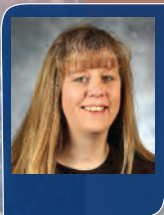
## KIM FOLSOM

On the men's side, Smith served as an assistant coach for three-straight U.S. National Junior Teams (1985-1987), and helped guide the 1986 team to the United States' first-ever medal — a bronze — at the IIHF World Junior Championship. In addition, he has twice served on the coaching staff for the U.S. Men's National Team (1987 and 1990) and served as an assistant coach for the 1988 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team.

Smith's most recent men's assignment was as head coach of the U.S. Men's Select Team at the 2007 Deutschland Cup. Prior to that, he led the 1998 U.S. Men's Select Team at the IIHF A-Pool World Championship Qualification Tournament in Klagenfurt, Austria, to qualify for the 1999 IIHF A-Pool World Championship.

A 1968 graduate of Harvard University, Smith has spent time as an assistant coach with four NCAA Division I men's ice hockey teams, including Boston University, Northeastern University, Yale University and the University of Massachusetts. He also served as head coach at Gloucester (Mass.) High School, his alma mater.

Smith resides in Gloucester, Mass., with his wife, Julie.

# 2009-10 RECAP | U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

14-0-1-7 OVERALL RECORD; 7-0-1-7 INTERNATIONAL RECORD

The 2009-10 U.S. Women's National Team was centralized in Blaine, Minn., a northern suburb of the Twin Cities, from September through January. During that time, the team trained on a daily basis at the Schwan Super Rink and Herb Brooks Training Center, both part of the National Sports Center. The squad competed on the Qwest Tour, a 10-game, nine-city domestic tour that began on Sept. 25 in St. Paul, Minn., and concluded on Feb. 4 in Colorado Springs,

Colo. On the Tour, Team USA faced off against Canada; Finland; all-star teams from the Western Collegiate Hockey Association, Hockey East and ECAC Hockey; and various other NCAA Division I women's ice hockey teams. In addition to the 10 Qwest Tour stops, the U.S. played in two international tournaments, as well as three games against the Canadian National Team in Canada and 10 supplementary games against boys' and men's teams.

#### SUMMARY

Team USA started the 2006 Olympic Winter Games strong, rolling through the preliminary round undefeated with a 3-0-0 record and outscoring opponents 18-3 in the process. The first round included wins over Switzerland (6-0), Germany (5-0) and Finland (7-3), and sent the U.S. to the semifinals against Sweden. Against the Swedes, the Americans held a 39-18 advantage in shots and were up 2-0, but ended up falling 3-2, in a shootout. The U.S. loss was the first-ever against Sweden and set Team USA up for a bronze-medal match-up with Finland, where the Americans posted a 4-0 victory.

#### SUMMARY

The Americans dominated their group in the preliminary round of the 2002 Olympic Winter Games, only allowing one goal in three victories, while scoring 27 of their own. The U.S. swept past Germany (10-0), China (12-1) and Finland (5-0) to secure a semifinal match-up with Sweden. There, Team USA extended its season-long win streak to 37 games with a 4-0 shutout of the Swedes to garner a spot in the gold-medal game and a chance to defend its Olympic championship. In a closely contested title game, the Canadians came up with the 3-2 win to give the U.S. the silver medal.

### SUMMARY

At the first Olympic Winter Games ever to host women's ice hockey, the Americans came in favored to capture the silver medal behind Canada, which had earned gold in four of the world championships to date. The format was such that the six teams would all play each other once to determine who earned a spot in the finale. The U.S. posted 5-0, 7-1 and 4-2 wins over China, Sweden and Finland, then downed host Japan, 10-0, to cement its place in the gold-medal game prior to the last round-robin match-up with Canada. After the Canadians took a 4-1 lead in the friendly match on Feb. 14, the Americans scored six unanswered goals in the final 11:53 of play in the game for a 7-4 win. In the historic gold-medal rematch three days later, Team USA garnered a 3-1 win to cap off its inaugural Olympic performance with a perfect 6-0-0 record.

## TOURNAMENT FORMAT

### THREE-POINT SYSTEM FOR PRELIMINARY ROUND

- Three points shall be awarded for the winning team at the conclusion of regulation.
- One point will be awarded to both teams at the conclusion of regulation if the game is tied.
- An additional point shall be awarded to the team winning the game in either the overtime period or the Game-Winning Shots Procedure.

### OVERTIME PROCEDURES

- If a preliminary round game is tied after three periods, a five-minute four-on-four sudden-death overtime period shall be played immediately after an intermission of three minutes. The teams will defend the same goals as in the third period.
- If a semifinal or bronze-medal game is tied after three periods, a 10-minute four-on-four sudden-death overtime period shall be played immediately after an intermission of three minutes. The teams will defend the same goals as in the third period.
- If the gold-medal game is tied after three periods, a 15-minute four-on-four sudden-death overtime will start immediately after a 15-minute intermission during which time the ice will be cleaned. The teams will change ends.
- If no goal is scored in the overtime period of any game, the Game-Winning Shots Procedure will apply.

### GAME-WINNING SHOTS PROCEDURE

- Three players from each team will take shots alternately until a decisive goal is scored. If the score is still tied after three shots by each team, the procedure will continue with a tiebreak sudden-death shootout by one player from each team. The teams must exhaust their rosters before allowing a player to shoot a second time. Should one team have fewer players than its opponent, both teams may recycle shooters once one team has exhausted its roster.

## MEDIA GUIDELINES

The 2010 Paralympic Winter Games sled hockey tournament falls under the governance of the International Paralympic Committee.

IPC protocol, as it pertains to media, is as follows:

- All accredited media shall have access to cover team practices, gameday skates and games in conformity with the IPC Handbook. Guidelines for news organizations' broadcast rights can be found at [paralympic.org/IPC/IPC\\_Handbook/](http://paralympic.org/IPC/IPC_Handbook/).
- Locker rooms are closed to all media.
- All postgame or post-practice player interviews will be conducted in a designated "mixed zone" area within the arena. Requests for interviews with members of the U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team outside of the arena should be directed to Alex Clark at (778) 938-8702 or (847) 302-1116.
- Players and coaches will be made available in the "mixed zone" no later than 10 minutes after the conclusion of a game or practice, with a general media access period of 30 minutes.

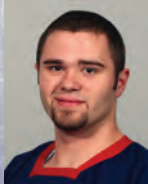

Brennan's ice hockey coaching experience includes serving as an assistant coach for the Victoria Cougars of the Western Hockey League in 1989 and as head coach of the Coronado (Colo.) High School men's ice hockey team from 1992-96.

His ice hockey playing experience includes a four-year (1982-86) career at Colorado College, where he served as team captain his final two seasons. Following his collegiate career, Brennan played professionally in Sweden for three years.

During the 2009-10 season, Maluta led the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team to a 9-3-1-3 overall record and first-place finishes at the 2009 World Sledge Hockey Challenge in Charlottetown, P.E.I., and the 2010 Japan Para Ice Sledge Hockey Championships in Nagano City, Japan.

As head coach of the 2008-09 U.S. National Sled Hockey Team, Maluta led Team USA to its first-ever International Paralympic Committee Ice Sledge Hockey World Championship gold medal in Ostrava, Czech Republic. There, the U.S. finished with a 3-1-0-1 record, including avenging the team's only loss of the tournament with a 1-0 win over Norway in the final game.

Maluta has been involved with USA hockey in a number of capacities of the years, including serving as the team leader of the U.S. Under-18 Select Team that competed at the 2007 Memorial of Ivan Hlinka Tournament in Piestany and Breclav, Czech Republic. Additionally, as executive general manager of the ESL Sports Centre in Rochester, N.Y., he has helped host numerous USA Hockey National Championships and Player Development Camps.

As a player, Maluta spent four years (1970-74) with the Flin Flon Bombers of the Western Hockey League. Following the 1973-74 season, in which the defenseman totaled 97 points (40-57) with the Bombers, Maluta was drafted in the seventh round (126th overall) of the NHL Entry Draft by the Boston Bruins. He went on to spend time with the Bruins and American Hockey League's Rochester Americans from 1975-80 before finishing his playing career in Europe with HC Salzburg in 1981.

Maluta resides in Rochester, N.Y., with his wife, Sandy. The couple's daughter, Andrea, played college hockey at Clarkson University.

**BILL CORBO** is coaching in his first Paralympic Winter Games and is in his second season as an assistant coach with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team.

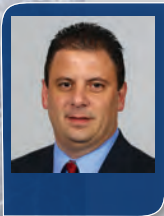

He and his wife, Katie, reside in Houghton, Mich.





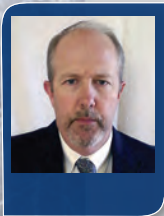
## BILL SANDBERG

**USA HOCKEY, INC.**, is the National Governing Body for the sport of ice hockey in the United States. Its mission is to promote the growth of hockey in America and provide the best possible experience for all participants by encouraging, developing, advancing and administering the sport.

USA Hockey's primary emphasis is on the support and development of grassroots hockey programs. In January 2009, the organization launched the American Development Model, which - for the first time ever - provides associations nationwide with a blueprint for optimal athlete development.

While youth hockey is a main focus, USA Hockey also has vibrant junior and adult hockey programs that provide opportunities for players of all ability levels. The organization also supports a growing disabled hockey program and maintains an inline hockey program to provide structure and support for its growth across the nation.

Beyond serving those who play the game at the amateur level, USA Hockey has certification programs for coaches and officials to ensure education standards are met that coincide with the level of play. Furthermore, a large focus is put on parent education with equipment needs, rules of the

game and parental roles in youth sports among common topics.

Members of the organization are entitled to many benefits, including a subscription to *USA Hockey Magazine*, the most widely circulated hockey publication in the world; excess accident, general liability and catastrophic insurance coverage; access to USAHockey.com; and opportunities to participate in USA Hockey National Championships, as well as player development camps.

USA Hockey is the official representative to the United States Olympic Committee and the International Ice Hockey Federation. In this role, USA Hockey is responsible for organizing and training men's and women's teams for international tournaments, including the IIHF World Championships, and the Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games. Closer to home, USA Hockey works closely with the National Hockey League and the National Collegiate Athletic Association on matters of mutual interest.

USA Hockey is divided into 12 geographical districts throughout the United States. Each district has a registrar to register teams; a referee-in-chief to register officials and organize clinics; a coach-in-chief to administer education program for coaches; a risk manager to oversee liability and safety programs; and a skill development program administrator to facilitate learn-to-play programs for youth players and their parents.





# RON DeGREGORIO

PRESIDENT

**RON DeGREGORIO** was elected the fourth president in the history of USA Hockey in 2003, after spending a lifetime and career dedicated to advancing the sport of hockey in America.

DeGregorio has been involved in the sport for more than 40 years as a player, coach, administrator and team owner. His first appointment with USA Hockey came in 1973 when he was named registrar for the New England District. DeGregorio was first elected to the USA Hockey Board of Directors in 1975 and was the organization's first vice president of youth hockey. In the 1980s, he served as treasurer of USA Hockey. In 1995, he was elected as a vice president and the international council chairperson, positions he held until being named president.

He has represented the United States at countless events during his tenure with USA Hockey. He served as team leader of Team East at the 1979 United States Olympic Festival, from which the 1980 "Miracle On Ice" U.S. Olympic Ice Hockey Team was chosen, and served in the same capacity for the 1994 U.S. Olympic Ice Hockey Team. DeGregorio has represented the United States at the 1998, 2002 and 2006 Olympic Winter Games and at numerous International Ice Hockey Federation Men's, Women's and Junior World Championships.

Honored with the National Hockey League's Lester Patrick Award in 2002 for outstanding service to ice hockey in the United States, DeGregorio is president of the PenFacs Group, an investment and insurance firm specializing in the design, administration and funding of executive benefit plans.

He resides in Salem, N.H., with his wife, Susan and has four grown children, Eric, Mark, Kim and Kara.



# DAVE OGREAN

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

**DAVE OGREAN**, one of the most respected leaders in amateur sports, returned to USA Hockey as executive director on Aug. 1, 2005. He previously held the position from 1993-99 and began his career in the sports industry with the organization (then the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States) as its director of public relations in 1978.

Under his leadership since returning to the organization, USA Hockey created a new department for membership development; began an annual nationwide celebration called Hockey Weekend Across America; hired the first-ever Chief Development Officer for The USA Hockey Foundation; executed a successful bid for the United States to host three World Championships; and led efforts that resulted in USA Hockey gaining responsibility for the selection process and induction event associated with the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame.

Among his many accomplishments during his first term as executive director, Ogrean oversaw a significant increase in membership and revenue, and the construction of the current national headquarters; helped create the National Team Development Program; was a driving force in establishing the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, presented annually to the top player in women's college ice hockey; and developed the concept of STAR (Serving the American Rinks) with U.S. Figure Skating.

Before returning to Colorado Springs, Ogrean served as executive director of USA Football from 2002-2005. He was recruited by the National Football League and NFL Players' Association to build a new, independent, non-profit organization to support and promote the sport of amateur football at all levels.

Prior to joining USA Football, Ogrean served as president and CEO of the Colorado Springs Sports Corporation, where he led the development and creation of the Colorado Springs Sports Hall of Fame and the Rocky Mountain State Games.

From 1999-2000, Ogrean worked for the United States Olympic Committee as deputy executive director of marketing. While there, he led the USOC team that, together with the Salt Lake organizing committee, generated almost \$200 million.

Previously, Ogrean served the USOC from 1990-93 as director of broadcasting. He was responsible for creating the initial broadcast division and generated over \$12 million in revenue as well as unprecedented exposure for the national governing bodies of Olympic sports.

From 1980-88, Ogrean worked at ESPN in corporate communications and programming.

Following a successful eight years at ESPN, Ogrean joined the College Football Association as assistant executive director for television. During his two-year tenure, he worked with CBS Sports on remote production, with CBS and ESPN on game scheduling and selection and helped launch the syndicated series, "This Week in College Football."

Ogrean received his Bachelor of Arts degree in English from the University of Connecticut (1974) and his master's degree in film from Boston University (1978).

Listed among *The Sporting News'* Top 100 Most Powerful People in Sports from 1993-99, Ogrean is currently among *The Hockey News'* Top 50 People of Power and Influence. He is a member of the nominating committee for the U.S. Olympic Hall of Fame and in the fall of 2009 served on the Selection Committee for the USOC CEO search.

He and his wife, Maryellen, have three grown children, Matt, Tracy and Dana.





## TONY ROSSI

VICE PRESIDENT, INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL CHAIR

Outside of a highly successful business career, **TONY ROSSI** has generously donated significant time, resources and expertise to USA Hockey for more than 30 years at the grassroots and executive leadership levels.

After beginning his volunteer career with the National Governing Body in the mid-1970s, Rossi was elected to the USA Hockey Board of Directors in 1983 and served as a director from the Central District until 1988. In 1989, he was elected to the USA Hockey Executive Committee, serving as secretary from 1989-95. In 1995, Rossi transitioned to the role of USA Hockey treasurer, a position he held until June 2003.

In his role as both secretary and treasurer, Rossi helped guide the formation and growth of The USA Hockey Foundation, a charitable and educational non-profit corporation that provides long-range financial support for USA Hockey and promotes the growth of hockey in the United States.

In June of 2003, Rossi was elected to his current post as USA Hockey vice president and international council chair. In his role, Rossi works closely with the organization's National and Olympic Team programs, as well as the International Ice Hockey Federation during a host of global competitions held throughout the year. He was elected to the IIHF Council in May of 2008.

Rossi also serves as president for RMK Management Corporation and Moran & Company.

He resides in Chicago with his wife, Marie, and has four children, Elena, Deanna, Michael, and Tony, Jr.



## WALTER L. BUSH, JR.

CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

One of the most recognized and respected leaders in hockey, **WALTER L. BUSH, JR.**, is the chairman of the board for USA Hockey, a position he has held since June 2003.

Bush, who served as a member of the organization's Board of Directors from 1959-2003, became president of USA Hockey in June 1986, following Wm. Thayer Tutt and Tom Lockhart. He served in the capacity for 17 years before taking his current position as chairman of the board. In recognition of his 45th year of service to USA Hockey, the organization dedicated its national headquarters as The Walter L. Bush, Jr. Center in June 1999.

Bush retired as a member of the International Ice Hockey Federation Council in May 2008 after a 23-year stint, the last 14 years as a vice president of the organization. He served on numerous committees within the IIHF, including as chairman of the IIHF Women's Ice Hockey Committee, the IIHF InLine Hockey Committee and the IIHF Hall of Fame Selection Committee.

Bush is a member of the Board of Directors of the USOC and is secretary of the U.S. Olympic Foundation. During the 2002 Olympic Winter Games, Bush received the Olympic Order from the International Olympic Committee, the highest honor in the Olympic movement.

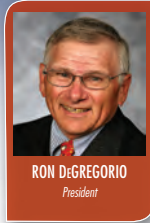

Bush resides in Naples, Fla., with his wife, Sis. He has a daughter, Anne Hanson, and two sons, Walter III and Steven.

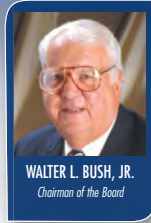

**IN 1996**, USA Hockey launched a revolutionary new initiative called the National Team Development Program, based in Ann Arbor, Mich. In its 13th season of play in 2009-10, the goal of this full-time development program is to prepare student-athletes under the age of 18 for participation on U.S. National Teams and success in their future hockey careers. Its efforts focus not only on

high-caliber participation on the ice, but creating well-rounded individuals off the ice.

The program is composed of two squads - the U.S. National Under-18 and Under-17 Teams. The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against NCAA Division I and III opponents, contests vs. USHL teams, as well as competition in three international tournaments.

The Ann Arbor Ice Cube, a first-class facility consisting of three ice sheets, locker rooms, offices, a training

area and weight room is home to the NTDP. Unlike other competitive athletic teams, the success of the NTDP is not gauged on wins and losses. Instead, the focus is on the development of skills and acquiring experience against older competitors.

"The National Team Development Program provides a tremendous opportunity for the elite young players in our country," said Ron DeGregorio, president of USA Hockey. "We've developed many programs over the years at USA Hockey and the NTDP is among our very best initiatives."

### WHAT THE PROGRAM HAS MEANT

In evaluating how the NTDP has impacted hockey in the United States, consider:

- The U.S. has won the gold medal at the IIHF World Men's Under-18 Championship in 2002, 2005, 2006 and 2009, with each team comprised primarily of NTDP players.
- The U.S., with a team comprised largely of NTDP players, captured its first-ever gold medal at the IIHF World Junior Championship in 2004.
- In 2008-09, more than 45 NTDP alumni were playing in the National Hockey League.

**AN AWARD OF** The USA Hockey Foundation, the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award has been presented annually to the top player in NCAA Division I women's ice hockey since 1998, with selection criteria including individual and team skills, sportsmanship, performance in the clutch, personal character, competitiveness and a love for the sport.

The award is named in honor of the late Patty Kazmaier, a women's hockey star and gifted scholar-athlete who attended Princeton University in the early 1980s.

A four-year varsity ice hockey letter-winner, Kazmaier anchored the Princeton defense and led the Tigers to the Ivy League Championship in three consecutive seasons (1982-84). She earned All-Ivy League Honorable Mention honors as a freshman and was named to the All-Ivy League Second Team in both her sophomore and junior seasons. After a one-year hiatus, Kazmaier returned to the Tigers and was named to the All-Ivy League First Team and the All-Eastern College Athletic Conference First Team as a senior in 1985-86. She was also honored as the Ivy League Most Valuable Player.

Kazmaier battled a rare blood disease for more than a year before passing away in 1990 at the age of 28.

Presented at an award ceremony in conjunction with the NCAA Women's Frozen Four in late March, the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award has been bestowed upon 12 exceptional athletes since its inception in 1998. Of those women, Angela Ruggiero (2004), Julie Chu (2007) and Jessie Vetter (2009) will represent the United States at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games.

Other previous Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award recipients include two-time Olympians Krissy Wendell (2005) and A.J. Mleczo (1999).

The 2010 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award will be presented in Minneapolis, Minn., on March 20.

**ON DECEMBER 1, 2009**, the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame inducted three players, a builder and a team as its Class of 2009. These individuals helped grow the game in countless ways, whether by eroding traditional gender barriers

exciting millions of fans or simply making the game more accessible to all. These great contributors were officially inducted in a ceremony at The Westin Boston Waterfront Hotel.

The 1998 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team captured the first-ever gold medal presented in women's ice hockey at an Olympic Winter Games, posting a perfect 6-0-0 record and defeating arch-rival Canada, 3-1, in the gold-medal game. Since the team's victory, girls' and women's hockey player registration in America has more than doubled.

Tony Amonte played 16 years in the NHL, amassing 900 career points (11th most among American-born players), making five all-star teams and breaking the 30-goal mark eight times. The two-time Olympian (1998, 2002) famously scored the game-winning goal in Team USA's victory over Canada to clinch the 1996 World Cup of Hockey. He also played on 2004 World Cup Team, two U.S. Men's National Teams (1991, 1993) and two U.S. National Junior Teams (1989, 1990).

Tom Barrasso, a two-time Stanley Cup champion with the Pittsburgh Penguins (1991, 1992), ranks first among U.S.-born goaltenders with 61 playoff victories and second with 369 NHL regular-season wins. He also helped the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team capture silver at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah. The only goaltender to play in the NHL directly from high school, Barrasso also played for the 1983 U.S. National Junior Team.

John LeClair, the first American-born player ever to record three straight 50-goal seasons (1995-98), ranks 13th among U.S.-born players with 819 career points. He led the silver medal-winning U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team with six goals at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah. He was also a member of the 1998 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, the 1996 World Cup Team and two U.S. National Junior Teams (1988, 1989).

Frank Zamboni patented the world's first self-propelled ice resurfacing machine after opening his own skating rink in Southern California in 1940. The Zamboni was introduced to the world at the 1960 Olympic Winter Games in Squaw Valley, Calif., and was named the "Official Ice Resurfer of the NHL" in 2002. Zamboni passed away in 1988 at the age of 87.

These diverse groups include participation, player development, opportunity, education, safety and commemoration.

USA Hockey's grassroots programs are aimed at increasing participation, improving skills and creating a responsible environment for the conduct of youth hockey. Through initiatives like the American Development Model, Affiliate Block Grant Program and OneGoal, USA Hockey looks to making the game more affordable, getting more kids of both genders to try the sport and convincing current athletes to continue playing into the future.

Elite player development has become paramount for USA Hockey's success as men's and women's teams are selected and trained to represent the United States at the Olympic, World, Junior and Under-18 levels of international competition. In 2009, USA Hockey enjoyed unparalleled success, with the U.S. Women's National Team, U.S. Women's National Under-18 Team, U.S. Men's National Under-18 Team and U.S. National Sled Hockey Team all winning gold medals at world championships. Success followed USA Hockey

into 2010 with the U.S. National Junior Team winning gold at the 2010 IIHF World Junior Championship.

Through the U.S. Women's National Program's residency training program in Blaine, Minn., and the National Team Development Program in Ann Arbor, Mich., USA Hockey is selecting and training the United States' best players and preparing them for world success.

In addition, The USA Hockey Foundation supports all four disciplines of disabled hockey, including standing amputee hockey, sled hockey, deaf and hard of hearing hockey, and special hockey. With programs like Ice Hockey in Harlem, the Fort Dupont Cannons hockey program in Washington, D.C., and USA Warriors Ice Hockey, USA Hockey and The USA Hockey Foundation are committed to giving everyone an opportunity to play hockey, regardless of physical or financial limitations.

USA Hockey also provides education for coaches, officials, parents and athletes. Structured national education programs for coaches and officials insure excellence and consistency throughout amateur hockey for these important positions. These programs are provided locally across the country as well as online through a virtual resource center. In addition, the Coaching Education Program is currently redesigning its coaching materials to include the long-term athlete development principles that are the cornerstone of the American Development Model.

Furthermore, The USA Hockey Foundation supports safety and protective equipment research and education to make the game as safe a possible for all participants. Specific initiatives include the "Heads Up" education program, concussion prevention education, CPR training at summer camps, studies of neck laceration injuries and guards, and the installation of defibrillators (AEDs) in rinks across the country.

The USA Hockey Foundation is also involved with several commemorative programs, including the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame, the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, the Lester Patrick Award, the Dave Peterson Memorial Fund and Coaches Symposium, and the Brian Fishman Internship and Memorial Fund.
