BOTTOM OF FOURTH

Sammy Ashkenazi - goes to second on throwing error off of ground ball.
Elliot Gindi - lines a base hit up the middle, scoring pinch run-

ner AJ Gindi with series' winning run.

BOTTOM OF SIXTH

Sammy Cohen - one out triple off of the rightfielder.

Sammy Ashkenazi - short fly ball which is enough to enable Sammy Cohen to score on a mad dash to the plate.

Richie Braha - hits the rightfield line in front of the foul pole and touches them all for leadoff home run.

A SALUTE TO THE CHAMPIONS

SAMMY "FRONT" ASHKENAZI

ALBERT BEYDA

- Every successful team has a player like Albert. Ready to step in whenever needed, Albert was the perfect role player.

RAYMOND BEYDA

ROBERT CHABBOT

- An underrated player on a team of underrated players. Made three exceptional plays on that final Sunday. Robert got the job done at second.

SAMMY COHEN

- One of the Runners' big guns. Sammy hits to all fields with power and has been a better outfielder each successive year. Sammy carried this team at times during the year.

BUCKY DOUECK

AJ GINDI
