Q. Who plays for Rampage and Monument Hockey?

A. Both are AAA programs, some of the highest-level hockey in the U.S. While Rampage plays in the Tier 1 Elite League, Monument Hockey plays in the East Coast Elite League. Boys come from across the U.S. to play at our facility. Billet players ages range from 15-18 years old.

Q. What is the timing of the season, how long will the boys need housing?

A. Arrival is generally mid-late August, and the season runs through mid-March. Most of the players will attend school locally and may stay until the end of the school year. However, some may do online classes and go home when the season is over.

Q. What are the benefits of being a billet family?

A. A new perspective on hockey, as seen through the eyes of your elite player. A first hand understanding of being a hockey fan, a hockey family and contributor to the growth and development of a young aspiring hockey player. The opportunity to make a difference in a young man's life. Lifelong relationships and memories of the experience and an opportunity to watch the growth and pursuits of a player wanting to take their hockey abilities to the highest level

Q. Do we have what it takes to be a billet family?

A. It is of great importance to our hockey association that we place our out-of-town players in caring family environments that are committed to providing a supportive home away from home. Opening your home takes time, patience, and a willingness to share. Additionally, one of the most keys to a successful experience is open communication from both parties.

Q. What makes a great billet family?

A. An open, sensitive and patient family. It can be overwhelming for a player to be so far away from home and away from their family. A thoughtful billet family appreciates that each player is unique, and that communication and mutual understanding takes effort. Billet families are those who truly wish to share their home and family with a billet. We do not accept billeters who are interested in money alone. Such motive is obvious to players and the hockey program coordinators, and interferes with the intended billeting experience: a safe, secure, welcoming environment to have the opportunity of pursuing hockey, to learn and grow in. For many boys this is their first time away from home. This alone is a growing and learning experience for them... whether its developing good communication skills, handling expenses, doing laundry, cooking, etc. A supportive billet home can help develop each into responsible young adults.

Q. Do I have time for a player?

A. Even the most self-assured players appreciate good quality time with their billet family. Will you be in town for the duration of your player's stay? (Absences must be approved by the Billet Coordinator in advance.) Is everyone in your household ready to accept someone with a different background? If you have children, are



they comfortable with bringing person into the family? Can you schedule to find time to help guide with your billet?



Q. What does the billet family provide?

A. A separate room for the player (or a shared room for 2 players) furnished much as a college dorm would provide for a student: bed, desk & chair and clothing storage.

Nutritious meals including breakfast, lunch and dinner, as well as healthy snacks.

A patient, caring and friendly home atmosphere.

The same attention and guidance you would want for your own children. Reach out to one of the billet coordinators for more info.

Q. Can a family host more than one player?

A. Yes. Two players can share living quarters, transportation expenses and often times provide camaraderie for one another.

Q. What are the player's responsibilities?

A. As a member of the household, players are expected to show respect and consideration for all host family members. They are required to follow all household rules as well as share in the daily chores, maintain their own room and do their own laundry.

Q. Is there compensation to the host family?

A. Yes, families receive a monthly billeting payment for each player. Besides offsetting the expenses, a family incurs when hosting a player, the compensation acknowledges the invaluable service families provide to the individual players and our hockey program.

Q. What about travel and game schedules?

A. Teams travel out of town about once a month. They have games in metro Denver area as well.

Q. What about players that do not drive?

A. Some of the younger players do not drive or their parents are uncomfortable with new drivers living away from home. Billet coordinators make every attempt to match non-drivers up with teammates or near teammates so that carpooling can be set up and the host family does not have to provide transportation on a frequent basis.
