#### TODAY'S GAME-

The United States meets host Czech Republic in the semifinal round of the 2019 Para Ice Hockey World Championship. Puck drop at Ostravar Arena is set for 8 p.m. local time (2 p.m. ET) and will be broadcast live in the U.S. on the Olympic Channel.

In Paralympic and World Championship play, this is just the fifth meeting between the U.S. and Czech Republic. A year ago, the two teams faced off in preliminary-round play at the 2018 Paralympic Winter Games -- a 10-0 win for Team USA. All-time, the U.S. is 3-0-1-0 and has outscored the Czechs, 17-2.

#### - TALKING POINTS -

#### **TEAM USA IN SEMIFINAL PLAY**

All-time, the U.S. is a perfect 5-0 in semifinal play at the world championship. Its last semifinal game in world championship play came on home ice in Buffalo, New York, where the U.S. defeated Norway, 6-0. Nine different U.S. players, including current U.S. players **Josh Sweeney** (1g, 1a), **Declan Farmer** (1g), **Brody Roybal** (1a) and **Luke McDermott** (1a) tallied a point as **Steve Cash** registered the shutout victory.

#### **HOST TEAM BRINGS THE CROWD**

The U.S. is excited of its semifinal opponent and the challenge it brings with an expected full crowd on Friday. Through four games, the host nation has averaged an attendance of 6,767 fans per game. Additionally, the tournament-opening (April 27) 10,173 spectators for the full day set a new single-day tournament record. That same day's Czech Republic vs. Japan tilt established a single-game record crowd of 7,224 spectators, which was then eclipsed on Tuesday (April 30) when the host nation's tilt against Italy brought in 7,700 fans.

#### **2009 GOLD-MEDAL GAME IN OSTRAVA**

In 2009, the world championship took place in Ostrava and saw the United States meet Norway in the gold-medal game. There, the back-and-forth affair came to a decisive end with 11 seconds to play in regulation when **Taylor Chace** passed the puck to **Andy Yohe** who tallied the game's only goal to give the United States its first-ever world championship title.

#### **OFF-DAY IN PRAGUE**

On Wednesday, Team USA took a three-hour train to visit Prague. Nicknamed "the City of a Hundred Spires," the players and staff dispersed throughout the city to explore Old Town Square, the medieval Astronomical Clock, Charles Bridge, Powder Gate and St. Vitus Cathedral.

#### **U.S. PRELIMINARY ROUND RECAP**

The U.S. skated with a perfect 3-0 record in Group A. It opened with a 3-1 victory over rival Canada on April 27 before blanking South Korea, 4-0, the following day to clinch Group A. With a semifinal berth secured, the U.S. closed group play with a 10-0 victory over Norway. Boxscores can be found on page 6.

Declan Farmer (4-3--7), Chris Douglas (1-3--4) and Noah Grove (3-0--3) have tallied a point in every game while Steve Cash (2-0) and Jen Lee (1-0) have shared goaltending duties.

#### **U.S. AMONG TOURNAMENT'S BEST**

Entering today, the U.S. sits among the top of the leaderboard in several statistical categories. Leading the way is Team USA's special teams, which has a perfect 100% penalty kill group while its powerplay percentage of 40.0% ranks second. Additionally, Team USA's 17 goals, .944 save percentage and 0.33 goals-against-average all rank second-best.

Among players, **Declan Farmer** leads the tournament in faceoff efficiency (71.4%), sits fourth in points with seven (4-3), third in goals (4) and is tied with teammate **Chris Douglas** for sixth in assists with three apiece. U.S. goaltender **Jen Lee** has a perfect 1.00 save percentage and 0.00 goals-against-average through 60 minutes of play while **Steve Cash** is third in both categories (.929 SV%; 0.60 GAA) through 75 minutes.

#### **LEADING TEAM USA-**

**David Hoff**, USA Hockey's Northern Plains District Coach-In-Chief and assistant coach of last year's gold medal-winning 2018 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team, is in his first season as head coach of the 2018-19 U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. This will be Hoff's third season with Team USA after making his debut in the 2016-17 season.

**Josh Pauls**, who has helped the U.S. capture the gold medal in the last three Paralympic Winter Games (2010, 2014, 2018), is serving as captain of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. In addition, two-time Paralympic gold medalists (2014, 2018) **Declan Farmer** and **Rico Roman** have been named alternate captains.

Pauls begins his 11th season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his second as team captain while Farmer is entering his seventh season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his second as an alternate captain. A Purple Heart recipient and U.S. Army Veteran, Roman is serving as an alternate captain for the first time as he begins his eighth season with Team USA.


#### LAST MEETING: 2019 WORLDS - USA 10, NOR 0

#### **2019 GROUPS**

#### **OTHER U.S. TIDBITS**

#### SINGLE-SEASON, CAREER RECORDS KEEP RISING

Forward **Declan Farmer** has a point in every game this season and leads the team with 23 points (13-10) in 10 games. His 23 points currently rank seventh-most ever by a U.S. player in a single season. Farmer and **Brody Roybal** hold four of the top-five ever single-season performances. Last season, Roybal set a U.S. record of 48 points (26-22) while Farmer set the second-best ever performance with 41 points (24-17).

**Kevin McKee** this season became the fourth U.S. player ever to eclipse the 100-point mark in their career, currently sitting at 103 (40-63). Only Farmer (95-77--173), Roybal (59-70--129) and **Josh Pauls** (41-72--113) have more career points. Farmer's 95 goals, 77 assists and 173 points are all U.S. career-best marks. Goaltender **Steve Cash** has played a U.S.-best 6,186 minutes

Goaltender **Steve Cash** has played a U.S.-best 6,186 minutes and entered the 2018-19 season with a career goals-against-average mark of 1.33 and 0.901 save percentage. Meanwhile, **Jen Lee** has skated 669 minutes and came into this year's campaign with a 0.51 GAA and 0.897 SV%.

#### **LOCKER ROOM VISITORS**

The U.S. has received notable postgame locker room visits here at the 2019 Para Ice Hockey World Championship.

Following Team USA's victory over Canada, the U.S. received a visit from **Stephen B. King**, U.S. Ambassador to the Czech Republic. King, who was confirmed by the Senate on October 5, 2017, hails from Madison, Wisconsin, where the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team has trained the last few years due to strong relationships developed by the late head coach and long-time Wisconsin Badger men's ice hockey coach, **Jeff Sauer**.

The U.S. has captured three gold medals in the events' nine-year history and enters the 2019 event seeking a sixth-straight berth in the gold-medal game. Additionally, this year's tournament will include a new format that is explained on page 3.

This is the second time the event will take place in Ostrava, which hosted the 2009 event and resulted in the U.S. capturing its first-ever world championship.

#### **WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP DEBUTS**

A total of five players made their debuts in world championship play in Team USA's 3-1 tournament-opening win over Canada, including **Ralph DeQuebec**, **Travis Dodson**, **Colin Gooley**, **Josh Hargis** and **Kyle Zych**. DeQuebec and Dodson were part of Team USA's gold medal-winning Paralympic entry a year ago while Gooley, Hargis and Zych are in their first season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team.

#### **JOURNEY TO OSTRAVA**

Team USA's journey to Ostrava, Czech Republic, started on Monday, April 22, with players and staff convening in Newark, New Jersey. From there, the team boarded a plane on Tuesday, April 23, and traveled overnight to Vienna, Austria, where the U.S. players and staff boarded a bus for a 3-hour trip to Ostrava.

#### THIS AND THAT

The 2019 Toyota-USA Hockey Disabled Hockey Festival included the Adult Sled Hockey National Championship in which the Chicago Blackhawks Sled Hockey Program (Travis Dodson, Kevin McKee, Brody Roybal) defeated the Gaylord Wolfpack (Declan Farmer, Jack Wallace) in Wesley Chapel, Florida ... Earlier this month, U.S. goaltender Jen Lee took part in the Boston Marathon, finishing the race in just under five hours ... Lee is just one of seven players on Team USA who hold military backgrounds, including three U.S. Army veterans in alternate captain Rico Roman, Lee and U.S. Army Ranger Josh Hargis and four U.S. Marines in Ralph DeQuebec, Travis Dodson, Luke McDermott and Josh Sweeney.

#### **USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS**

#### **U.S. INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS**

Entering the 2018-19 season, no other nation has claimed more medals in Olympic, Paralympic and International Ice Hockey Federation play than the United States' 44 since 2010. Additionally, Team USA's 26 collective gold medals also leads all nations. In total, the last eight years has seen the U.S. claim 26 gold medals, 12 silver medals and six bronze medals.

The 26 gold medals span seven events, including the Olympic Winter Games (2018 - Women), Paralympic Winter Games (2010, 2014, 2018), IIHF Women's World Championship (2011, 2013, 2015-17), IIHF World Junior Championship (2010, 2013, 2017), IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship (2010-15, 2017), IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship (2011, 2015-18) and IPC Para Hockey World Championship (2012, 2015).

#### **2019 U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM**

The 2019 International Ice Hockey Federation Men's World Championship will be held in Kosice & Bratislava, Slovakia, from May 10-26, 2019. The U.S. will compete in Group A alongside Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Great Britain and Slovakia. The U.S. will open the competition against host Slovakia on Friday, May 10 at 2:15 p.m. ET.

Team USA enters the 2019 competition after earning bronze

Team USA enters the 2019 competition after earning bronze last May in Copenhagen, Denmark. The bronze-medal win gave the U.S. its third bronze medal (2013, 2015, 2018) and fourth top-four finish in the last six IIHF Men's World Championships, a feat the country has not accomplished since medaling in three of the five tournaments it competed in from 1939-1950.

To date, the U.S. has tabbed 20 players to its preliminary roster, headlined by captain **Patrick Kane** (Chicago Blackhawks). **Chris Drury** (New York Rangers) is the general manager of the 2019 U.S. Men's National Team while **Jeff Blashill** (Detroit Red Wings) has been tabbed to serve as head coach for the third straight year.

#### 2019 U.S. UNDER-18 MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

The U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team earned a bronze medal at the recently competed 2019 IIHF Under-18 World Championship in Ornskoldsvik and Umea, Sweden.

The U.S. defeated Canada, 5-2, to earn its 16th straight medal in the event. That span has included six gold medals in the past 10 tournaments. Its most recent gold came in 2017, when it captured its tournament-record 10th gold.

## **2019 U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM**

The U.S. Women's National Team captured its fifth consecutive gold medal at the International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship in 2019 with a thrilling shootout win over Finland in the gold-medal game.

The 2019 tournament included competition among 10 women's national teams for the first time, as opposed to eight in previous years. The U.S. competed in Group A alongside Canada, Finland, Russia and Switzerland. Group B includes the Czech Republic, France, Germany, Japan and Sweden.

The United States entered the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship having won gold in the past four Women's World Championships (2013, 2015, 2016, 2017).

#### **2020 U.S. NATIONAL JUNIOR TEAM**

The United States recently named **Scott Sandelin** (Hibbing, Minn.) as head coach of the 2020 U.S. National Junior Team that will compete in the 2020 IIHF World Junior Championship in Ostrava and Trinec, Czech Republic. This is the fourth time Sandelin will serve on a U.S. National Junior Team and his second time doing so as head coach. On April 13, he led the University of Minnesota Duluth men's ice hockey team to its second consecutive NCAA national championship.

Additionally, **Steve Miller** (Sun Prairie, Wis./Ohio State University), **David Lassonde** (Durham, N.H./Dartmouth College), **Jerry Keefe** (Saugus, Mass./Northeastern University) and **Brett Larson** (Duluth, Minn./St. Cloud State University) will serve as assistant coaches for the United States in the Czech Republic.

#### – 2018-19 SEASON OVERVIEW -

Team USA's 2018-19 campaign started last July, with the 17-player U.S. roster selected following tryouts. In December, the U.S. opened international play at the 2019 Para Hockey Cup in London, Ontario where it skated to a perfect 5-0 record to capture its fifth-straight title in the event. In March, the U.S. hosted Canada for a two-game series in Indian Trail, North Carolina, that resulted in the both teams each claiming one win.

Team USA's season leaders include forwards **Declan Farmer** and **Brody Roybal**, who respectively hold 16 (9g-7a) and 14 (4-

10) points through seven games apiece this season. Farmer's nine goals leads all U.S. skaters as does Roybal's 10 assists. In goal, **Steve Cash** has a perfect 4-0 (W-L) record and carries a team-best 1.25 goals against average.

#### 2018 PARA HOCKEY CUP GAME-BY-GAME

#### **GAME 1: USA 3, CANADA 0**

In its tournament-opener, the U.S. blanked Canada, 3-0, as Farmer tallied a goal and an assist and **Kyle Zych** scored his first goal in his national team debut. Goaltender Steve Cash made nine save to secure the shutout and Rico Roman scored Team USA's third goal in the win.

#### **GAME 2: USA 9, SOUTH KOREA 0**

**Luke McDermott** scored twice and eight other U.S. players registered at least one point as the U.S. defeated South Korea, 9-0, in its second game. **Jen Lee** earned the shutout in net while Josh Hargis became the second newcomer to score his first goal as a member of Team USA.

#### **GAME 3: USA 4, CANADA 1**

Declan Farmer netted two goals and Josh Pauls added a goal and an assist as Team USA edged Canada, 4-1, to maintain its perfect tournament start. Kevin McKee also scored as Steve Cash earned his second win.

#### **GAME 4: USA 8, SOUTH KOREA 0**

Brody Roybal and Declan Farmer each tallied five points and 10 other players collected at least one point to lead the 2018-19 U.S. National Sled Hockey Team past South Korea, 8-0, in its final preliminary round game. **Colin Gooley** registered an assist for his first point with Team USA.

#### **GAME 5: USA 5. CANADA 4 (CHAMPIONSHIP)**

A back-and-forth affair culminated in the United States capturing a thrilling 5-4 victory. **Jack Wallace** had two goals and an assist, Josh Sweeney added two helpers and Steve Cash turned aside seven shots in the victory.

#### 2019 SLED SERIES GAME-BY-GAME

#### **GAME 1: USA 3, CANADA 4**

Brody Roybal registered a goal and an assist and five other players tallied a point but the U.S. fell to Canada, 4-3, in its first game of the 2019 Sled Series in Indian Trail, North Carolina. The loss was Team USA's first of the season.

## GAME 2: USA 4, CANADA 1

Josh Pauls and Declan Farmer each posted a goal and an assist to lead the United States past Canada, 4-1, to close the 2019 Sled Series with its sixth victory of the season.

#### **WINNING WAYS**

Including its 10 games this season, the United States holds a 52-4-1-4 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record over the last four seasons. Those 52 wins include a Paralympic gold (2018), two world championship medals (gold - 2015, silver - 2017), five-straight Para Hockey Cups (2015, 2016 (Jan.), 2016 (Dec.), 2017, 2018), the 2016 IPC Pan-Pacific Championship and the 2018 Turin Para Ice Hockey International Tournament. Additionally, since 2009, Team USA has reached eight consecutive gold-medal game botths at the Paralympic and World Championship level game berths at the Paralympic and World Championship level. In those appearances, the U.S. has posted a 6-2 record while claiming three Paralympic gold medals (2010, 2014, 2018) and three world championship gold medals (2009, 2012, 2015). Its two losses came in world championship play (2013, 2017).
