### **U.S. IN QUARTERFINALS**

The U.S. is 11-0-0-7 (W-OTW-OTL-L) all-time in IIHF World Junior Championship quarterfinals, including a 4-0-0-1 record in its last five quarterfinal games. USA is 2-0-0-0 versus Finland in quarterfinals, including a 6-2 victory in 2010. The U.S. enters the 2020 event having outscored opponents, 17-5, in its last four quarterfinals. In the team's most recent quarterfinal matchup, the U.S. won, 3-1, over the Czech Republic thanks to **Cayden Primeau's** 18-save performance.

### **TALKING POINTS**

### **GOLD MEDAL REMATCH**

The U.S. and Finland meet in 2020 IIHF World Junior Championship quarterfinals after playing in the 2019 gold-medal game. It is the first time since the 2015 IIHF World Junior Championship, when Sweden and Finland squared off in quarterfinals, that the previous year's gold-medal game teams played one another in quarterfinals the following year. Finland won the gold-medal game in 2014 over Sweden, 3-2, but would go on to lose the following year to Sweden, 6-3.

### **DOMINANCE OVER THE PAST DECADE**

The U.S. and Finland led all teams in IIHF World Junior Championship play the past decade, with three gold medals apiece. The U.S. has medaled in seven of the last ten years, including its current four-year podium streak (gold - 2017; silver - 2019; bronze - 2018, 2016), the first time it has accomplished the feat in U.S. history. Only Russia, with eight medals, has more than USA since 2010.

### **U.S. VERSUS FINLAND**

The U.S. holds a 5-2-0-3 (W-OTW-OTL-L) advantage over Finland in its previous 10 matchups, including two quarterfinals victories. Finland defeated the U.S., 3-2, in the 2019 World Junior Championship gold-medal game, as Kaapo Kakko scored with 1:26 remaining in regulation. Finland has not won back-to-back World Junior Championship games against the U.S. since 2003.

### **TOURNAMENT LEADERS**

Entering quarterfinals play, the U.S. has three players ranked in the top-10 in points: **Trevor Zegras** (9 points - 1st), **Shane Pinto** (7 points - T-2nd) and **Arthur Kaliyev** (6 points - T-8th). Pinto and Kaliyev are T-2nd in goals scored with four each. A U.S. player has finished as the tournament's top points-getter 10 times in World Junior Championship history (full list on Page 2 of these game notes).

### **2019 TO NHL**

Six players from the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship silver-medal team have played NHL games this season: **Joel Farabee** (Philadelphia Flyers), **Jack Hughes** (New Jersey Devils), **Quinn Hughes** (Vancouver Canucks), **Ryan Poehling** (Montreal Canadiens), **Cayden Primeau** (Montreal Canadiens) and 2020 U.S. National Junior Team forward **Oliver Wahlstrom** (New York Islanders).

### **TIDBITS**

Forward **Cole Caufield** is celebrating his 19th birthday today (Jan. 2). Defensemen **Spencer Stastney** (Jan. 4) and **Cam York** (Jan. 5) will be celebrating their birthdays later this week ... After playing back-to-back games, Team USA enjoyed an off-day on New Year's Eve (Dec. 31). The team celebrated with a steak dinner in Ostrava ... **Cole Caufield, K'Andre Miller** and **Alex Turcotte**, all currently playing at the University of Wisconsin, were on the ice for USA's three-on-three overtime-winner against Czech Republic ... **Trevor Zegras'** nine assists in four games already tops three of the past five end of tournament assist leaders. The IIHF World Junior Championship has never had a points leader without a goal scored. The next closest was American forward **Phil Kessel** (1-10–11) who led tournament scoring in 2006.

### - TEAM USA AT THE WORLD JUNIORS -

Entering the 2020 IIHF World Junior Championship, the U.S. holds an all-time event record of 140-9-6-116-11 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) and has earned 12 podium finishes, including four gold medals (2004, 2010, 2013, 2017), two silver medals (1997, 2019) and six bronze medals (1986, 1992, 2007, 2011, 2016, 2018). The U.S. has medaled in seven of the last ten years, including the last four years (gold - 2017; silver - 2019; bronze - 2018, 2016), the first time it has accomplished the feat in U.S. history. Additionally, Team USA's three gold medals since 2010 (2010, 2013, 2017) are tied with Finland for the most of any nation. In each of the last four IIHF World Junior Championships, a U.S. player has earned Media All-Star Team honors, including Ryan Poehling (2019), Casey Mittelstadt and Kieffer Bellows (2018), Clayton Keller and Charlie McAvoy (2017), and Auston Matthews and Zach Werenski (2016). Poehling (Forward), Mittelstadt (Forward) and Werenski (Defense) were also tabbed with Directorate Awards.

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# **ADDITIONAL NOTES**

### **IIHF WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP RECORD**

In the U.S.-Russia preliminary game, forwards Arthur Kaliyev and Nick Robertson scored six seconds apart, giving the U.S. a 2-0 lead in the second period. The goals tied the World Junior Championship record for fastest two goals scored by the same team.

### **USA FACEOFF LEADERS**

Five USA forwards currently have 50% faceoff records or better: **Shane Pinto** (61.0%), **Jack Drury** (58.8%), **Jacob Pivonka** (55.1%), Alex Turcotte (54.1%) and John Beecher (50.0%). Only USA and Sweden can boast five skaters with 50% faceoff records or better. Pinto, who is 47-30 on the draw, ranks 8th among tournament skaters with a minimum of 30 faceoffs.

### **HISTORY OF SCORING LEADERS**

A U.S. player has led the tournament in points 10 times in World Junior Championship history: Casey Mittelstadt (2018), Derek Stepan (2010), James van Riemsdyk (2008), Erik Johnson (2007), Phil Kessel (2006), Brian Gionta (1999), Jeff Farkas (1998), Mike York (1997), Doug Weight (1991) and Jeremy Roenick (1989). The U.S. currently has three players ranked in the top-10 in scoring: Trevor Zegras (9 points - 1st), Shane Pinto (7 points - T-2nd) and Arthur Kaliyev (6 points - T-8th).

### **TEAM USA TOURNAMENT RANKINGS**

Heading into quarterfinals, the U.S. defense has been stingy, of the top six teams in fewest shots allowed (Russia, USA, Canada and Germany). Despite the commitment to defense in Group B, the U.S. still ranks 4th in goals scored (17), tied with Canada for most Jacob Pivonka's father, Michal Pivonka, skated for Czechoslovakia among Group B teams after preliminary play.

### **CZECH TIES**

Jacob Pivonka would visit his Czech family during the summer when he was young. Jacob's father Michal skated for Czechoslovakia at the World Junior Championship in 1986, 1985 (silver) and 1984 (bronze), serving as captain in both 1986 and 1985. Michal was à third round pick of the Washington Capitals in 1984 and went NHL, all with Washington. on to play 13 seasons in the NHL, all with Washington. **Bobby Brink's** father, Andy Brink, played in the 1994 IIHF World Junior Championship for Team USA at Ostrava, Czech Republic. The U.S. would go on to finish sixth in the tournament. Andy played four years seven games. Alfie was a 1983 first round selection of the Montreal of college hockey at the University of Minnesota.

### **MEET THE CAPTAINS**

(C) MATTIAS SAMUELSSON: One of five returnees from last is currently skating in his second season at Western Michigan University (NCHC) where he currently serves as an alternate captain. Samuelsson previously served as captain for Team USA at the 2018 Under-18 Men's World Championship where Team USA won a silver medal. A native of Voorhees, N.J., Samuelsson was drafted by the State University (CCHA) for four seasons, followed by a six-year Buffalo Sabres in the second round, 32nd overall.

(A) K'ANDRE MILLER: Miller is currently playing in his second season at the University of Wisconsin (Big Ten). Miller's international experience includes winning a silver medal at both the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship and the 2018 Under-18 Men's World Championship. A native of Minnetonka, Minn., Miller was drafted by the New York Rangers in the first round, 22nd overall.

(A) OLIVER WAHLSTROM: Wahlstrom is currently playing in his first professional season with the Bridgeport Sound Tigers (AHL). Wahlstorm, who made his NHL debut earlier this season with the New York Islanders, is one of five returnees from last year's silvermedal winning U.S. Junior National Team. Wahlstrom also played and 20 games in total. NHL Network's **Stephen Nelson** will call Team twice in the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship, winning a USA games with longtime NCAA hockey analyst **Dave Starman** gold medal in 2017 and silver in 2018. Additionally, Wahlstrom won and reporter Jill Savage. NHL Network's flagship studio show NHL a gold medal at the 2016 Youth Olympic Games with Team USA. A native of Quincy, Mass., Wahlstrom was drafted by the New York Islanders in the first round, 11th overall.

### **RECORD FOUR STRAIGHT YEARS WITH A MEDAL**

The U.S. has medaled at the IIHF World Junior Championship in four consecutive years, the longest streak in U.S. history. Five players currently on the 2020 U.S. roster earned a silver medal at the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship in Vancouver, British Columbia.

### **HOCKEY BLOODLINES**

Mattias Samuelsson's father, Kjell Samuelsson, won a gold medal with Sweden at the 1991 Men's World Championship and a Stanley Cup with the Pittsburgh Penguins in 1992. Kjell was a 1984 sixth round draft pick of the New York Rangers and went on to play 14 years in the NHL with the New York Rangers, Philadelphia Flyers, Pittsburgh Penguins and Tampa Bay Lightning. Kjell is the Director of Player Development currently with the Philadelphia Flyers. Mattias' brother, Lukas Samuelsson, is a current teammate at Western Michigan University (NCHC).

Jack Drury's father, Ted Drury, skated on two U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Teams (1992, 1994) in addition to playing eight seasons in the NHL with the Ottawa Senators, Anaheim Ducks, Hartford Whalers and Calgary Flames. Jack's uncle, Chris Drury, skated on three U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Teams (2002, 2006, 2010), helping the United States earn two silver medals (2002, 2010). Chris also skated 14 years in the NHL with the New York Rangers, Buffalo Sabres and Colorado Avalanche. In 1996, he helped the Avalanche with the Stanley Cup and is the only player in history to win both allowing the 3rd least amount of shots (107). Group B features four the Hobey Baker Award as the best college player and the Calder Memorial Trophy as best NHL rookie.

> at the World Junior Championship in 1986, 1985 (silver) and 1984 (bronze), serving as captain in both 1986 and 1985, and led his team in scoring en route to a silver medal in 1985. Michal's 26 points (15-11-26) in 21 games rank 4th all-time in Czechoslovakia and Czech Republic World Junior Championship history, while his 21 games played rank 2nd all-time. Michal was a third round pick of the Washington Capitals in 1984 and went on to play 13 seasons in the

> Alex Turcotte's father, Alfie Turcotte, skated for Team USA at the 1984 World Junior Championship scoring 11 points (2-9-11) in Canadiens and played seven years in the NHL.

Nick Robertson's brother, Jason Robertson, played for Team USA at the 2019 World Junior Championship winning a silver medal. Jason year's silver-medal winning U.S. Junior National Team, Samuelsson finished T-2nd in team scoring with seven points (1-6-7). Jason is a Dallas Stars 2017 second round pick, and currently skates with the Texas Stars (AHL).

> Curtis Hall's father, Mike Hall, previously played at Bowling Green professional career that included 18 games with the Providence Bruins (AHL).

> Oliver Wahlstrom's father, Joakim Wahlstrom, played hockey at the University of Maine for two seasons (1988-90) prior to playing professionally in the Swedish Elite League.

> Bobby Brink's father, Andy Brink, played four years at the University of Minnesota.

John Vanbiesbrouck is serving as general manager of the 2020 U.S. National Junior Team. He served in a similar role for the 2019 silver medal-winning U.S. National Junior Team. The 2007 U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame inductee has previously represented the United States as a player on nine occasions, including one Olympic Winter Games (1998), two Canada Cups (1987, 1991), four men's world championships (1985, 1987, 1989, 1991) and two world junior championships (1982, 1983). A full-time employee of USA Hockey, Vanbiesbrouck began his duties as assistant executive director of hockey operations for USA Hockey on June 4, 2018. His responsibilities include oversight of all of USA Hockey's international efforts, including its men's, women's and sled programs as well as the National Junior Development Program.

### **ABOUT SANDELIN**

Head coach of the University of Minnesota Duluth men's ice hockey team, Scott Sandelin is head coach of the 2020 U.S. National Junior Team. He returns to the U.S. National Junior Team bench for a fourth time, and his second as head coach. Sandelin, who coached the U.S. to a fourth-place finish on home ice in 2005 in Grand Forks, North Dakota, and Thief River Falls, Minnesota, was an assistant coach on last year's silver medal-winning entry and fulfilled the same duties in 2012. Sandelin, who skated in the 1982 World Junior Championship, joins Phil Housley as the only two U.S. head coaching members to both coach and play in the World Junior Championship. Sandelin's time behind the Bulldogs bench has been highlighted by a trio of NCAA national championships, including backto-back title wins the last two seasons (2017-18, 2018-19). Since taking the helm in 2000-01, his 21-6 record and .778 win percentage in NCAA Tournament play is the best of any active bench bosses.

### **COACHING STAFF'S WINNING PEDIGREE**

All five members of the 2020 U.S. National Junior Team coaching staff hold winning pedigrees at the collegiate and international level. Combined, the staff has coached 108 NCAA seasons while contributing to eight international medals, six NCAA national titles and 13 conference championships (post-season). Internationally, the five coaches have represented the U.S. a combined 16 times. Scott Sandelin, David Lassonde, Steve Miller and Jerry Keefe all served as assistants on last year's silver medal-winning 2019 U.S. National Junior Team. Lassonde was an assistant for the gold medal-winning 2013 U.S. National Junior Team. Additionally, Miller helped the 2017 U.S. National Junior Team to a gold medal finish. Brett Larson most recently served as head coach for the 2012 U.S. Junior Select Team that won the World Junior A Challenge.

### **USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS-**

### **U.S. INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS**

Since 2010, no other nation has claimed more medals in Olympic, Paralympic and International Ice Hockey Federation play than the 49 by the United States. Additionally, Team USA's 28 collective gold medals also leads all nations. In total, the last nine years has seen the U.S. claim 28 gold medals, 14 silver medals and seven bronze medals.

The 28 gold medals span seven events, including the Olympic Winter Games (2018 - Women), Paralympic Winter Games (2010, 2014, 2018), IIHF Women's World Championship (2011, 2013, 2015-17, 2019), IIHF World Junior Championship (2010, 2013, 2017), IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship (2010-15, 2017), IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship (2011, 2015-18) and IPC Para Hockey World Championship (2012, 2015, 2019).

### 2019 U.S. HOCKEY HALL OF FAME INDUCTION

Five American hockey legends including **Gary Bettman, Brian Gionta, Neal Henderson, Tim Thomas** and **Krissy Wendell** were formally enshrined into the United States Hockey Hall of Fame on Dec. 12 during a sold-out induction ceremony at the Marriott Marquis Washington D.C.

In addition to the induction of the Class of 2019, **Jack Blatherwick** was awarded the Lester Patrick Trophy, presented for outstanding service to hockey in the United States. **Alex Ovechkin** was awarded the Wayne Gretzky International Award, which pays tribute to the growth of hockey in the United States.

### **2019 U.S. JUNIOR SELECT TEAM**

The U.S. Junior Select Team finished third in the 2019 World Junior A Challenge in Dawson Creek, British Columbia. The team was comprised of players competing in the United States Hockey League, the lone Tier I junior league in the U.S.

Anthony Noreen (Kearney, Neb.), head coach and general manager of the Tri-City Storm, served as head coach with assistant coaches Mark Abalan (Sioux City, Iowa), Shane Fukishima (Waterloo, Iowa) and David Wilkie (Omaha, Neb.).

The U.S. has finished first in six of the last ten tournaments (2010, 2012-14, 2016, 2018) and has occupied a top-three spot at the World Junior A Challenge every year since joining the tournament in 2007.

### **RIVALRY SERIES**

The women's national teams from the U.S. and Canada are competing in a five-game Rivalry Series in 2019-20. The U.S. is off to a 2-0-0 start after defeating Canada 4-1 in Hartford, Conn., on Dec. 14, and 2-1 in Moncton, N.B., on Dec. 17. **Alex Cavallini** and **Alex Carpenter** were named U.S. Player of the Game, respectively.

The final three games of the Rivalry Series are set for Feb. 3 in Victoria, British Columbia; Feb. 5 in Vancouver; and Feb. 8 in Anaheim, California. Tickets for the game in Anaheim at Honda Center are currently on sale at hondacenter.com, Ticketmaster. com or the Honda Center box office. To purchase tickets by phone, fans can call 714-704-2500.

### **USA HOCKEY'S AMERICAN DEVELOPMENT MODEL TURNS TEN**

USA Hockey celebrates its 10th year of the American Development Model this season. The ADM is USA Hockey's nationwide player-development program for youth hockey associations. It's based on age-appropriate, age-specific competition and training for boys and girls, beginning with their first steps onto the ice and carrying them through age 18 and beyond. ADM places a heightened emphasis on skill development and long-term athlete development principles, providing a blueprint for the best possible youth hockey experience.

### 2020 U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

On Nov. 1, USA Hockey announced the 23-player roster for its U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team that will compete for its fifth gold medal in six years at the 2020 International Ice Hockey Federation Under-18 Women's World Championship Dec. 26-Jan. 2 in Bratislava, Slovakia. The roster features 10 players that helped the U.S. earn silver at last year's IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship in Obihiro, Japan.

Maura Crowell (Mansfield, Mass.), head women's ice hockey coach at the University of Minnesota Duluth, is serving as head coach of Team USA. She is joined by assistant coaches Brianna Decker (Dousman, Wis.), member of the gold medal-winning 2018 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team, and Josh Sciba (Westland, Mich.), head women's ice hockey coach at Union College.

The team, currently playing in Bratislava, Slovakia, will be playing for its eight gold medal today (Jan. 2) against rival Canada. It is the 13th consecutive gold-medal game for the U.S.

### 28 AMERICAN OFFICIALS IN 11HF COMPETITION

A total of 28 American officials have been selected to serve as referees or linesmen for International Ice Hockey Federation events and the Youth Olympic Games in 2019-20.

American officials will take part in 18 IIHF events this season, including the IIHF World Junior Championship, the IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, the IIHF Women's World Championship, and the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. ### **2020 HOCKEY WEEK ACROSS AMERICA**

USA Hockey's yearly nationwide initiative Hockey Week Across America, now in its 13th year, will take place from Feb. 16-23, 2020. The daily themes will include salutes to players (Feb. 17), coaches (Feb. 18), officials (Feb. 19) and local rinks (Feb. 20) followed by the traditional themed days of Wear Your Favorite Hockey Jersey Day (Feb. 21), Try Hockey Day (Feb. 22) and Celebrate Local Hockey Heroes (Feb. 23). ### **USA HOCKEY'S NATIONAL TEAM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM**

Founded in 1996, USA Hockey's National Team Development Program began operations in Ann Arbor, Mich., and remained there until the summer of 2015. The full-time program is composed of two squads, the U.S. National Under-18 Team and U.S. National Under-17 Team, who compete in the USHL as well as against international and collegiate competition.

The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against NCAA Division I and III opponents, USHL teams as well as competition in three international tournaments.

### **USA HOCKEY ARENA**

USA Hockey Arena is a two-sheet facility with regulation ice (85x200) in the main arena and Olympic-size ice (100x200) for the secondary sheet. Acquired by the USA Hockey Foundation on April 1, 2015, the facility has added 20,000 square feet to the property that includes a 9,800-square-foot workout facility, additional offices and a conference center. In total, the facility encompasses 170,000 square feet with the main rink providing 3,504 seats for hockey games and 4,500 seats for other performances and events. Accompanying the facility is the USA Hockey Summer Drive-In, which has three large screens that show first-run double-features seven nights a week, as well as CJ's Brewing Company.
