The March Alumni of the Month is Mayte Alonso of Oxnard PAL. Alonso joined Oxnard PAL's YDC program when she was llyears old serving as YDC President for two years, and as a member of the CAL PAL youth board of directors for four years. She has carried that devotion beyond her YDC involvement. volunteering for the Washington Lawyers Committee as a Worker's Rights Assistant Clinic Coordinator, interned for Congresswoman Julia Brownley's 2016 campaign, and served as Vice Chair in the City of Oxnard's Youth Commission. Her journey, from where she started, to attending Georgetown University is a manifestation of her commitment to assisting at-risk youth in Oxnard and not only bettering her own life but bettering the lives of those in underserved communities.
