MY WHY TOUR, PRESENTED BY TOYOTA

Every athlete has their 'why.' As part of the U.S. Women's National Team's preparations for the 2022 Olympic Winter Games, Team USA will showcase their collective 'why' this fall on the My Why Tour, presented by Toyota. Team USA will play a series of games, both domestically and abroad, facing a number of international opponents. Additionally, via USA Hockey's social channels, athletes will share their collective 'why' through a video series. Follow the action by using #MyWhyTour or visit MyWhyTour.com for game and Tour updates.

OLYMPIC RESIDENCY PROGRAM

In October, USA Hockey launched a residency program in Blaine, Minn., for 28 of the top female athletes in preparation for the 2022 Olympic Winter Games. The centralized group will train and play together in games both domestically and abroad, in the months leading up to the Games in Feb. 2022, utilizing the National Super Rink in Blaine as its home base. Of the 23 players still in the residency program, 15 have Olympic experience, with 13 having played on the 2018 gold medal-winning squad. The final 23-player roster will be announced on Jan. 1 during the second intermission at the NHL Winter Classic in Minneapolis.

LAST TIME OUT

Team USA and Canada last met on December 15 at Centene Community Ice Center in Maryland Heights, Mo., with Canada sneaking out a 2-1 OT victory. Hilary Knight (Sun Valley, Idaho) recorded Team USA's lone goal, a highlight-reel score from behind the net in the second period, as the U.S. out shot Canada, 32-26, dominating play for a majority of the game. Megan Keller (Farmington, Hills, Mich.) and Kendall Coyne Schofield (Palos Heights, III.) recorded the assists, while Alex Cavallini (Delafield, Wis.) stopped 24 of 26 shots in net.

QUICK SHOTS

TONIGHT'S MATCHUP

Tonight's match up marks the second meeting in three days between the two squads and sixth overall as part of the My Why Tour, presented by Toyota. Team USA has won two of the last three match ups.

USA VS. CANADA
One of the most prolific rivalries in all of sports, the U.S. and Canada are no strangers to each other over the years. The two teams have met seven time in the last five months dating back to the IIHF Women's World Championship in late August. The road team has now won every My Why Tour game, with an additional four meetings between the two squads slated.

GOOD KNIGHT

Forward **Hilary Knight** (Sun Valley, Idaho) has tallied four goals in the last three games, including a highlight-reel goal from behind the net in Wednesday's game. Knight leads all scorers during the My Why Tour and has two game-winning goals (Nov. 21 and Nov. 23) on the series as well.

Through the first four games, Team USA is outshooting Canada, 125-111, and has scored four of its nine goals on the power play.

SPREAD THE LOVE

Through five games of the My Why Tour, presented by Toyota, 11 of Team USA's 23 players have hit the score sheet, recording at least one point. Four different players have hit the back of the net with Knight leading the way with four, followed by **Amanda Kessel** (Madison, Wis.) and **Hayley Scamurra** (Getzville, N.Y.) with two

grew up 16 miles west of the Centene Community Ice Center in
O'Fallon, while Hensley played college hockey at Lindenwood
University. Cavallini currently calls St. Louis home.

A total of 17 players on the roster hail from a midwestern state, with six from Minnesota, five from Illinois, three from Wisconsin, two from Michigan and one from Missouri.

The U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey team is set to be announced on Jan. 1 at the NHL Winter Classic in Minneapolis, Minn. The final, 23-player roster will debut during the second intermission.

TEAM USA AT A GLANCE

ROSTER BREAKDOWN

The current My Why Tour roster features 23 players, including 21 from the silver medal-winning team that competed at the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship in Calgary in August. Fifteen players have Olympic experience, including 13 of who were on Team USA back in 2018 when the U.S. won gold at the 2018 PeyongChang Winter Olympic Games. The roster was recently reduced from 28 to 26 in the middle of November and from 26 to 23 in the middle of December.

AYE AYE CAPTAINS

Kendall Coyne Schofield (Palos Heights, III.) is the captain of Team USA for the My Why Tour, after serving in the same capacity during the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship. Hilary Knight (Sun Valley, Idaho), Brianna Decker (Dous'Mann, Wis.) and Lee Stecklein (Roseville, Minn.) will wear the 'A' Team USA after also serving as alternated during the Women's Team USA after also serving as alternates during the Women's World Championship.



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2021 IIHF WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP RECAP

2021 U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

After enduring a year of cancellations and postponements due to the ongoing global pandemic, the U.S. Women's National Team returned to the ice for the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship in Calgary, Alberta, from August 20-31, 2021. Team USA extended its championship game-appearance streak to 21 consecutive gold medal games, as the U.S. has reached the final game in every WWC contested. The United States met host Canada in the gold-medal match, but ultimately fell 3-2 in an overtime thriller.

Forward **Hilary Knight** (Sun Valley, Idaho) had a record-breaking tournament, setting the all-time Women's World Championship goals record, surpasing Hall of Famer **Cammi Granato's** 45 career goals. Knight also passed Granato for the American all-time point record at the Women's World Championship, while linemate Brianna Decker (Dousman, Wis.) became the all-time U.S. assist leader at women's worlds.

PRELIMINARY ROUND: TEAM USA 3, SWITZERLAND 0

Grace Zumwinkle (Excelsior, Minn.) netted her first career U.S. Women's National Team goal to give the U.S. a three-goal advantage in a victory over Switzerland. Team USA outshot the Swiss 58-10.

PRELIMINARY ROUND: TEAM USA 3, FINLAND 0

The U.S. outshot Finland, 39-10, en route to its second-consecutive shutout. Zumwinkle, Kelly Pannek (Plymouth, Minn.) and Knight each scored in consecutive periods.

PRELIMINARY ROUND: TEAM USA 6, ROC 0

Knight broke the all-time goal record in the second period, as six different Team USA players tallied a goal. Alex Cavallini (Delafield, Wisc.) earned her second shutout of the tournament.

PRELIMINARY ROUND: CANADA 5, TEAM USA 1

Lee Stecklein (Roseville, Minn.) tallied the lone U.S. goal in the final preliminary round game of the WWC.

QUARTERFINAL ROUND: TEAM USA 10, JAPAN 2

Seven different U.S. players scored, including two from Knight, as she tallied a three-point day, breaking the American all-time point record at the WWC.

SEMIFINAL ROUND: TEAM USA 3, FINLAND 0

Team USA's goaltenders pitched their fourth shutout of the tournament as the red, white and blue outshot Finland 33-14 en route to the championship game.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME: CANADA 3. TEAM USA 2 (0T)

Team USA jumped out to a 2-0 lead, but fell 3-2 in overtime.

U.S. HOCKEY HALL OF FAME

U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Induction celebration took place on December 9 in Denver and celebrated the enshrinement of both the Class of 2020 and 2021. **Dean Blais, Tony Granato, Jenny Potter** and **Jerry York** were inducted as part of the Class of 2020, while **Stan Fischler, Paul Holmgren** and **Peter McNab** entered as the Class of 2021.

2022 U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

2022 U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM
USA Hockey announced the 23-player roster that will make up the 2022 U.S. Under-18 Women's
National Team and represent the red, white and blue at the 2022 IIHF U18 Women's World Championship,
Jan. 8-15, in Linköping and Mjölby, Sweden. Katie Lachapelle (Lewiston, Maine), head women's ice
hockey coach at Holy Cross, will serve as head coach. The U.S. will look to take home back-to-back
golds after topping Canada, 2-1, in overtime in 2020. The 2021 championship was canceled due to
the pandemic.

THE BRIANNA DECKER ENDOWMENT FOR GIRLS HOCKEY

The Brianna Decker Endowment For Girls Hockey is going national. Started in 2018 by two-time Olympian Brianna Decker (Dousman, Wis.), and in conjunction with the USA Hockey Foundation, the endowment aims to provide grants to girls hockey organizations to increase female youth participation in hockey by alleviating costs around ice and equipment, advertising and marketing, and overall development. Originally aimed at girls programs in Decker's home state of Wisconsin, the grant program will expand to organizations country-wide in 2021. For more information, visit usahockeyfoundation.

USA HOCKEY FOUNDATION'S RAISE THE FLAG CAMPAIGN
As USA Hockey looks to the 2022 Olympic Winter Games, the USA Hockey Foundation has launched the Raise The Flag campaign aimed at supporting USA Hockey's three national team programs as they all prepare for the upcoming 2022 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games. The necessary funding will support the increased costs of essential training camps, tournaments, travel and sustaining the USA Hockey Arena in Plymouth, Mich.

LET'S ROLLOn the 20th anniversary of the September 11th attacks, the U.S. Women's, Men's and Sled National teams have adopted the mantra 'Let's roll' as a way to commemorate and honor the victims. The mantra, used by Flight 93 passenger Todd Beamer, were the last known words heard spoken by him as he rallied fellow passengers as they planned to attack the hijackers in the cockpit and regain control of the aircraft. Flight 93 crashed in Shanksville, Pa. killing all on board. The U.S. Women's National Team visited the National September 11 Memorial and Museum in New York City on an off day in late October. The team also holds 2006 U.S. Olympian Kathleen Kauth in their thoughts as Kauth's father, Don Kauth, was killed in the attacks that day.



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2021 U.S. COACHING STAFF -

JOEL JOHNSON, HEAD COACH

Joel Johnson is serving as head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team for the 2021-22 season and will lead Team USA in Beijing as the head coach of the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team in February.

His first involvement with USA Hockey dates back to working summer camps in 2000 and has been closely involved with the U.S. Women's National Team program since 2015, highlighted by leading Team USA to a silver medal at the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship and to four straight gold medals (2015-18) in the IIHF U18 Women's World Championship.

Johnson has served as head coach of the U.S. Under-22 Women's Select Team on two occasions for the U22 Series against Canada, leading the U.S. to a three-game sweep in 2018 and a 2-1 series victory in 2019. He made his U.S. Women's National Team debut as an assistant coach in 2018-19 and helped guide the U.S. to the gold medal at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship in Espoo, Finland.

Johnson was tapped to be head coach of the women's ice hockey team at the University of St. Thomas in 2021 as the Tommies transitioned to playing Division I hockey. Prior to UST, he spent 16 years (1999-2004 and 2010-21) as assistant or associate coach for the University of Minnesota women's hockey team, helping the Gophers to six national titles (2000, 2004, 2012, 2013, 2015 and 2016.)

Johnson coached at his alma mater, Bethel University, for six seasons (2004-10), including three as the head men's ice hockey coach. Along with his hockey responsibilities, he was the men's and women's golf coach, and prior to that, coached soccer, where he earned MIAC Coach of the Year honors. In 2010, Johnson returned to Minnesota and helped the Gophers to five straight NCAA national championship game appearances from 2012 to 2016, winning back-to-back national titles in 2012 and 2013 and again in 2015 and 2016, along with recording a perfect 41-0-0 season in 2012-13.

COURTNEY KENNEDY, ASSISTANT COACH

A two-time Olympic medalist for Team USA, Kennedy will serve as an assistant coach for the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team, after making her U.S. Women's National Team debut on the coaching staff of the silver medal-winning 2021 IIHF Women's World Championship team. Kennedy served as an assistant coach of the U.S. National Under-18 team for the 2016-17 and 2017-18 seasons, helping lead the team to its third-and fourth-straight gold medal at the IIHF U18 World Championships and at the 2013 and 2014 IIHF U18 World Championships, helping lead the squad to silver medals at both tournaments. She also served as an assistant coach of the U22 team at the 2019 Women's National Festival. Kennedy, who has coached 15 seasons on the Boston College women's hockey staff, serves as the associate head coach for the Eagles. As a player, Kennedy was a two-time All-American defender at Minnesota in 1999 and 2001 and helped lead Minnesota to its first national title in 2000. As a senior, the blue liner earned Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year honors. She was also a top-three finalist for the Patty Kazmaier Award. Kennedy earned a silver medal at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah, and a bronze medal at the 2006 Games in Torino. Italy. She also helped the U.S. capture its first gold medal at the IIHF Women's World Championship in 2005.

BRIAN POTHIER, ASSISTANT COACH

Pothier will serve as an assistant coach for the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team, his fifth coaching assignment with Team USA after serving as an assistant coach during the 2021 IIHF Women's World Championships. Pothier helped lead the U.S. to a gold medal at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship, in addition to serving on the staff at the 2019 Rivalry Series and the 2018 Four Nations Cup. Pothier has served as a camp coach at the 2018 USA Hockey Women's Winter Training Camp, the U.S. Women's National Team Evaluation Camp and the USA Hockey Women's National Festival. A former NHL defenseman and U.S. Men's National Team alumnus (2007 IIHF Men's World Championship), Pothier signed with the Atlanta Thrashers before spending his first year with the Orlando Solar Bears. He went on to win both the Turner Cup and Rookie of the Year and American-born Rookie of the Year honors in 2000-2001. Pothier played on the Ottawa Senators, Washington Capitals and Carolina Hurricanes organizations before retiring from hockey in 2012. Pothier now coaches all ages at Pothier Blueline Hockey in Rochester, Mass.

STEVE THOMPSON, GOALTENDING COACH

Thompson is making his first appearance on an Olympic coaching staff and will serve as the goaltending coach for the 2022 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team. Thompson made his international coaching debut during the 2018-19 season, serving on Team USA's staff during its gold medal-run at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship and the Four Nations Cup. Additionally, Thompson served as the goaltending coach for the 2021 U17 Men's Select Team that took home the Five Nations Tournament title and for the last eight years, has served as a goaltending coach and evaluator at USA Hockey's district and select camps. He began his professional career on the coaching staff at the University of Alaska Anchorage, spending time as the director of hockey operations, strength and conditioning coach and goaltending coach over three seasons. He played four seasons of college hockey (2009-13) as a goaltender for the University of Alaska Fairbanks. Currently, Thompson is the ADM manager of goaltending for USA Hockey, where he is responsible for the development and management of the American goaltending program.
