LAST TIME OUT

Abbey Murphy tallied a hat trick, and Taylor Heise notched a goal and three assists to help lift the U.S. to a 4-1 victory in the opening contest of the 2025 Rivalry Series, Presented by Discover. Despite Canada scoring the opening goal of the game early in the first, the U.S. responded with four unanswered to give them the game one victory. Aerin Frankel recorded 26 saves in net.

RIVALRY SERIES, PRESENTED BY DISCOVER

One of the fiercest rivalries in all of sports returns as the U.S. Women's National Team and Canada face off in the 2025 Rivalry Series, presented by Discover. Slated for four games, the series opens up with two games in the United States in November, followed by the final two games of the series in December in Canada.

This season's series serves as an evaluation and preparation tool for the upcoming Olympic Winter Games in Milan in February 2026.

Established by USA Hockey and Hockey Canada during the 2018-2019 season, the Rivalry Series is an annual showcase of the highest level of women's hockey at varying locations in the United States and Canada.

TEAM USA IN THE COMMUNITY

USA Hockey and the U.S. Women's National Team are committed to growing the game in communities across the United States. In every U.S. city hosting a Rivalry Series game, members of the national team participate in community outreach events aimed at connecting with both girls and women's hockey players in the local area.

In the days leading up to the first game of the Rivalry Series, USA Hockey partnered with the Cleveland Monsters and local youth hockey associations to get out in the community.

Team USA players, along with Cleveland Monsters players teamed up to host a ball hockey clinic with kids from Douglas MacArthur Girls Leadership Academy, an all girls school in Cleveland. In addition, they hosted a bring a friend to skate at BAM Arena with over 80 kids.

QUICK SHOTS

TODAY'S MATCH UP

Today's game is the second game of the 2025 Rivalry Series, presented by Discover. It marks the second meeting in three days for the two teams and the final time the U.S. will play at home before the Winter Olympics in February.

The U.S. opened the series with a 4-1 victory on Thursday in Cleveland in front of 7,000 fans. The final two games of the series will be held in Edmonton Dec. 10 and 13.

IN THE RIVALRY SERIES

Started during the 2018-19 season by USA Hockey and Hockey Canada, the Rivalry Series enters its sixth season (2018-19, 2019-20, 2022-23, 2023-24, 2024-25, 2025-26), with the teams even with an all-time record of 10-4-4-10 (W-OTW-OTL-L) and the U.S. holds a record of 6-1-1-1 in series games played in November.

OPENING WITH A WIN

Team USA has won game one of the Rivalry Series for the sixth-straight series (2018-19, 2019-20, 2022-23, 2023-24, 2024-25, 2025-26). The U.S. opened this season's series with a statement 4-1 victory.

HOME SWEET HOME

Playing in Buffalo is a homecoming for a number of Team USA players. Hayley Scamurra grew up in Getzville, N.Y., a suburb of Buffalo, while Haley Winn hails from Rochester, N.Y., about an hour east of Buffalo. Both are expected to have many friends and family in attendance.

HEISE'S HUGE GAME

In Thursday's victory, Taylor Heise recorded four points (1G, 3A), including the opening goal of the game. It marked Heise's largest single-game output in the red, white and blue since the semifinals of the 2022 IIHF Women's World Championship when she tallied five points (2G, 3A) in a 10-1 win over Czechia.

MURPHY RECORDS HAT TRICK

On Thursday Abbey Murphy recorded a hat trick to lead the U.S. to a 4-1 victory. It marked the team's first hat trick against Canada since Hilary Knight tallied three in the gold medal game of the 2023 IIHF Women's World Championship, where the U.S. won 6-3.

USA HOCKEY IN BUFFALO

USA Hockey has hosted a number of different events in Buffalo in the last year. Outside of game two of the Rivalry Series, the 2025 World Para Ice Hockey Championships were held at the LECOM Harborcenter May 24-31, 2025. The U.S. went undefeated in the tournament, ultimately defeating Canada, 6-1, in the gold medal game. Additionally, the slate of Boys National Player Development Camps took place at The Northtown and Daemen University in Amherst, N.Y. the end of June and early July.

TEAM USA AT A GLANCE

ROSTER BREAKDOWN

The 2025 U.S. Women's National Team features 30 players, 17 forwards, 10 defenders and three goaltenders, and boasts all 25 players from the 2025 team that took home gold at Women's Worlds. Emma Peschel is slated to make her U.S. Women's National Team debut.

LEADERSHIP CORE RETURNS

Hilary Knight (Sun Valley, Idaho) is the captain of Team USA for the 2025 Rivalry Series. Alex Carpenter (North Reading, Mass.) and Megan Keller (Farmington Hills, Mich.) returns as alternate captains.

BEHIND THE BENCH

John Wroblewski is the head coach of the 2025 U.S. Women's National Team. Shari Dickerman, Brent Hill and Josh Sciba are serving as assistant coaches, while Alli Altmann is the team's goaltending coach.

JOHN WROBLEWSKI, HEAD COACH

John Wroblewski is serving as the head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team for the 2025 Rivalry Series after leading Team USA to a gold medal at the 2025 and 2023 IIHF Women's World Championship and silver at the 2022 WWC and 2024 WWC.

Wroblewski joined the U.S. Women's National Team following two years (2020-22) as the head coach of the Ontario (Calif.) Reign, the AHL affiliate of the LA Kings, and four seasons (2016-20) as the bench boss of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program.

Over his four years with the NTDP, the program reached its first USHL playoff berth since 2012 and finished top-three in all 12 international tournaments played. He led his team to 33-consecutive international victories from 2016-18, and also oversaw the development of 29 NHL Draft picks, including Jack Hughes, who was selected first overall by the New Jersey Devils in 2019.

At the IIHF level, Wroblewski guided the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team twice, resulting in a gold in 2017 and bronze in 2019.

The Neenah, Wisconsin, native began his coaching career as an intern assistant coach with the NTDP and was promoted to a full-time assistant coach the following season, a position he held from 2008-10.

Wroblewski, a player on the inaugural NTDP roster in 1997, skated four years with the University of Notre Dame (1999-2003). He went on to play four years (2003-07) professionally with the ECHL's Fresno Falcons, recording 125 points (65-60) in 273 career games.

ASSISTANT COACHES

SHARI DICKERMAN, ASSISTANT COACH

Shari Dickerman is returning as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team during the Rivalry Series, after serving in the same capacity since the 2022-23 season.

Dickerman, who is in her second season as head coach at Minnesota State University, previously served as assistant coach of the 2022 U.S. Collegiate Women's Select Team, that competed at the 2022 Collegiate Series against Canada in August. Prior to her appointment to the USA Hockey staff, Dickerman served as an evaluator at numerous USA Hockey camps.

A member of the Mavericks staff since 2009, Dickerman has helped lead Minnesota State for the last 15 seasons and was named head coach in March 2024.

As a player, Dickerman was an All-American goaltender for the Mavericks.

BRENT HILL, ASSISTANT COACH

Brent Hill is returning as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team during the 2025 season, after serving in the same capacity since the 2022-23 season.

Hill is currently serving as an assistant coach of the Quinnipiac Women's Ice Hockey team, a role he's held for the last three seasons.

Hill was on the bench as an assistant coach for the 2015 U.S. Under-18 Women's World Championship, leading the squad to a gold medal at the 2015 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship.

Prior to Quinnipiac, Hill spent four seasons at the helm of Bishop Kearny Selects Academy, following a season as an assistant coach at Merrimack University and four seasons as an assistant coach at RPI.

JOSH SCIBA, ASSISTANT COACH

Josh Sciba is reprising his role on the U.S. Women's National Team staff during the 2025 season, after serving in the same capacity since the 2022-23 season.

As an assistant coach, Sciba helped lead the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team to a gold medal at the 2022 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, after serving in the same capacity for the 2019 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team.

Sciba is in his second season as assistant coach for the New York Sirens, following a six-year stint as head coach of Union College.

As a player, Sciba was a member of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program from 2001-03, prior to playing four years at the University of Notre Dame.

ALLI ALTMANN, GOALTENDING COACH

Alli Altmann returns as the goaltending coach of the U.S. Women's National Team after serving on the U.S. Women's National Team staff for the last five seasons (2021-2025).

Altmann also guided the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for four seasons, having served in the goaltending coach role from 2017-22. She guided the U.S. to two golds and two silvers during that time.

Altmann is currently the co-owner and vice president of DEVENIR Goaltenders. She played four seasons for Minnesota State University, recording a career .901 save percentage.
